DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Sweat Mansion is a large oblong-shaped three-story brick structure with low hip roof, roof balustrade, and a semi-circular one-story portico. The house is about 52 feet wide and 42 feet deep. The walls are of brick laid in Flemish bond and the foundations are of stone. The main (south) elevation is five-bays wide and is dominated by the one-story semi-circular portico located in the center bay. The porch has two columns and two engaged columns in the Doric order which support an entablature comprised of an architrave, a frieze decorated with triglyphs, and a modillioned cornice. The roof of the portico is crowned with a wood balustrade that is surmounted by small urns. The center door is flanked by side lights and these are topped by a wide elliptical fan light. In the second story, over the entrance way, is a fine Palladian window.

First-story windows in the main facade are full-length, on the other three elevations they are of regular size. Third-story windows are reduced in height. First and second-story windows have flat arches and are topped by white denticulated cornices. The roof has an excellent cornice decorated by a row of inverted cove brackets and, at the eaves, a graceful balustrade surmounted by urns encloses the low hip roof. The mansion has four large brick chimneys, one is located in each of the side (east and west) walls and two are set in the rear (north) wall.

A 12-foot wide central hall extends through the mansion from front to rear and divides the four rooms on the first floor into pairs. The splendid flying staircase, located in the center and near the rear of the hall, is freestanding and rises two stories in height. To the left (or west) of the hall, in the southwest corner, is the large drawing room, and in the rear, the smaller-sized library. On the east side of the hall, in the southeast (front) corner, is the dining room and in the rear, the kitchen. These two rooms are separated by a lateral side hall that contains the service stairs. Windows are recessed and have interior shutters; the floors are of wide boards. The fine carving in the hall was executed by Hanison Brazier. The dining room and drawing room have carved molding, wainscoting, pediments over doors and fireplaces, and elaborate plaster cornices in the Adam style. The second floor, containing four bedrooms, has a plan similar to the first floor and its hall is lighted by the Palladian windows located in the front and rear walls. The master bedroom in the southwest (front) corner and the chamber in the southeast corner also have fine mantels.

The Sweat Mansion is in excellent condition and is open to visitors as a furnished historic house exhibit. S

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Designed and built by John Kimball, Sr. and erected in 1800, the Sweat Mansion is a superb and little-altered example of an Adamesque Federal brick town house.

History

The mansion was built in 1800 for Hugh McLellan, a wealthy Portland Merchant, from plans prepared by John Kimball, Sr., architect-Builder. Cost of construction is said to have amounted to \$20,000. The house was acquired by Asa Clapp for \$4,500 in 1820. From 1823 to 1880 it was the residence of General Joshua Wingate and his family. The property became the residence of Lorenzo de Medici Sweat in 1880 and on September 30, 1907, his widow left the mansion to the Portland Society of Art on condition that a suitable memorial building be erected. This structure, designed by the architect John Calvin Stevens and known as the L.D.M. Sweat Memorial Art Museum, was built in the rear of the mansion and opened to the public on April 22, 1911.
