

Summary

Constructed c. 1878, the Camp Methodist Church is a single-story frame building resting upon a new continuous stone foundation and covered by a steeply pitched, metal-clad gable roof. The roof is adorned by a bell tower, which also is capped by a metal gable roof. There are no extant chimneys. A classroom addition was added to the rear of the building in 1959. The interior has been altered by the application of modern wood panelling on the walls and the sloped sections of the tray ceiling. Located on Arkansas Highway 9 in Camp, the church is in good condition.

Elaboration

Constructed c. 1878, the Camp Methodist Church is a single-story frame building resting upon a new continuous stone foundation and covered by a steeply pitched, metal-clad gable roof. The roof is adorned by a bell tower which projects from the center of the front facade and is capped by a metal end gable roof. Exterior walls are sheathed with white-painted weatherboard. There are no extant chimneys.

The front, or north, elevation contains a double-leaf entrance with fivepanelled wood doors centered in the bell tower and shielded by a small metal

shed roof. No windows are present on this elevation, however the facade profits from two well-placed pointed-arch vents in the bell tower. One of the wood-louvered vents is positioned near the center of the pediment area of the background gable end while the second vent is placed at the peak of the bell tower. Two smaller rectangular wood vents are used on the side elevation of the bell tower and are located just under the eaves.

The side elevations are identically fenestrated with three symmetrically placed, one-over-one, double-hung, pointed arch, wood windows.

Originally a rectangular-plan, one-room structure, the Camp Methodist Church was enlarged in 1959 with the addition of a classroom to the rear of the building. Although this wood-frame, drop-sided addition is covered primarily by a shed roof across the rear of the church, it presents a saltbox appearance when viewed from the side elevations due to its mass extending beyond the width of the church. Both side elevations contain a single six-over-six, double-hung wood window and an inset porch supported by a single wood post. Both porches are oriented to the north with a single-leaf entrance. A concrete handicapped-accessible ramp has been added to the southern porch. The rear elevation of the addition is fenestrated by five of the six-over-six windows with two of them paired in the center of the facade.

The interior of the church has been altered by the application of modern wood panelling over the walls and the two sloped sections of the tray ceiling. A photograph from the early 1980's reveals white-painted walls of unknown composition (perhaps gypsum board) with stained beaded-board wainscoting. The wainscoting is still intact under the current panelling. The original wood flooring remains after being leveled and refinished during the 1980s renovation. A raised stage with pulpit is located at the southern end of the sanctuary. A single-leaf door in the center of the rear wall accesses the classroom addition.

Located on Arkansas Highway 9 in Camp, the church is in good condition. There are no associated outbuildings, and the adjacent cemetery, though historic, is not included in the nomination at this time.

Summary

The Camp Methodist Church is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance as a good example of a rural vernacular frame church with some Gothic Revival-style detailing and as the best example of this type in the Camp community.

Elaboration

According to The Goodspeed Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Northeastern Arkansas, Enos C. Hunter, the first judge of the county court, settled at Indian Camp in 1840. During this period, the Indian Camp community included land along Camp Creek and that part of the South Fork of Spring River that was nearest to present-day Camp. The current community of Camp, which is located six miles northeast of Salem, the Fulton County seat, on Arkansas Highway 9, consolidated in the 1870s with the arrival of the Sutherland family.

B. F. Sutherland moved to the Camp after leaving Tennessee and living in Jackson County, Arkansas for a few years. When his father, Wesley Sutherland, moved to Camp, they obtained farm land, a mercantile store, a grist mill and a cotton gin, all of which were described by Goodspeed in the 1889 publication. A post office was obtained on February 12, 1884. B. F. Sutherland's son, J. N. Sutherland, continued the store, post office and farming until his death in 1960.

As there was no place to worship, B. F. Sutherland and his neighbors cleaned a portion of the gin building and built some seats and started a church. Later a building (pre-dating the nominated property) was purchased and moved to a place near the cemetery and used as a church. It is not the building that stands there today. W. S. Southworth, who was admitted to the Methodist Conference in 1874 was the first Methodist preacher to preach for the Camp Methodist Congregation.

A cemetery was also started sometime during this period. According to local historian Vester Williams in a 1961 newspaper article, "[the cemetery] was used as a public burying ground before 1878, when the church was built there." The church referenced is the current Camp Methodist Church being nominated. Constructed by local carpenters, the new church building also housed school classes until a new facility was built in 1914.

Initially in the Paragould District of the North Arkansas Conference, the Camp Methodist Church was later placed under the jurisdiction of the Mammoth Spring District and finally the Batesville District. By the 1980s, the membership declined to the point that services were discontinued; however, in the summer and fall of 1983, a group of former members gathered at the dilapidated church and decided to renovate the historic structure. Upon completion of the repairs, church services resumed.

The Camp Methodist Church is locally significant under Criterion C as one of the last remaining examples in Fulton County of a rural, one-room, frame church of Plain Traditional construction enhanced with Gothic Revival-style elements.



Beginning at a point created by the intersection of the eastern/southeastern curb of Arkansas Highway 9 and a line formed by, yet five feet from, the western elevation of the church, proceed south along said line to its intersection with a line formed by, yet five feet from, the southern elevation of the church; then proceed east along this line to its intersection with a line formed by, yet twenty feet from, the eastern elevation of the church; then proceed north along said line to its intersection with Arkansas Highway 9; then proceed southwesterly along the curb to the point of beginning.
Boundary Justification:
This boundary includes the historic church and surrounding property but excludes the adjacent historic cemetery which has yet to be surveyed.




