Built in 1912, the Clover Hotel is a two story structure with hipped roofs joined at the corner of the "L" shaped floor plan. The external sides of the "L" form a 50' facade on Main Street and a 100' facade along Oklahoma Avenue. The interior of the "L" forms a secluded courtyard and garden that extends 50' west of the hotel along Main Street bordered by a low wall made from large river rocks. The use of stuccoed exterior walls, a Spanish clay tile roof, the wrought iron balcony on the second level above the roof of the arcaded porch, and the courtyard are reminiscent of the Spanish Colonial Style but other elements are more common to early twentieth century Plains Commercial structures (especially the repetition of double-hung sash windows the transoms: above the second floor interior room doors, the elaborate pressed-tin ceiling on the first floor, and the 4x5-lighted exterior doors as a main entry and directly above on the balcony. Each of the nineteen hotel rooms on the second floor are original with plastered walls, wood plank floors, a doublehung sash window, a paneled wood door with transom and wood framed doorways with molded entablatures. Other features on the second floor are also original, such as the framed molding on corners in the hallway and raised ceramic tile floors for the two bathrooms and semi-eliptical arched entries.

The alterations to the hotel have been few. A one story 40x25' section has been added along Oklahoma Avenue to the alley to be used as the living quarters for the hotel keeper, but its location along the side street and the use of similar materials and landscaping minimize the intrusion. Other alterations have included the modernization of the interior on the back half of the first floor to accomodate the restaurant, but these are mostly surface additions of paneling, partitions, and carpeting. On the other hand, the upper level of the hotel retains most of its original appearance except for the addition of a lowered acoustical ceiling and linoleum tiles to the hall floors. The basic architectural and historical integrity remains.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Established in 1912 to serve the transient population that came to Laverne with the construction of the railroad and the establishment of the town, the Clover Hotel continued to serve as a hotel until 1980 when due to dwindling business and outdated accomodations, the hotel was closed, but the restaurant remained to serve the community. At one time considered a "fancy" hotel, the two story, stuccoed, Spanish style hotel has many of the original portions of the interior. The nineteen hotel rooms, the fixtures and the decorative details (such as bathroom fixtures, the banister, doors with transons, light fixtures, and the downstairs pressed tin ceilings), especially the upstairs which served as the hotel. Even the outside retains its original appearance with the Spanish-style arcaded porch with a bannister above and a clay tile, hipped roof. The only modification upstairs has been a lowered acoustical ceiling that is now being removed to expose the original ceiling. Downstairs modifications have been mostly decorative applications, rather than structural, to accomodate the modern restaurant facilities.
