The Gold Brook Covered Bridge is unique in Vermont, being the only bridge supported by timber Howe trusses which carries a <u>public highway in the state</u>. (One other bridge of the same truss type still stands in Vermont near East Shoreham, but it was built for railroad use.) The Howe truss, with its iron suspension rods and angle blocks, represents the transition from wood to iron for structural material in bridge construction.

John W. Smith built the Gold Brook Bridge about 1344, which ranks it among the earliestapplications of the Howe truss.<sup>1</sup> (The first bridge of the type was constructed in Massachusetts in 1838.<sup>2</sup>) The Gold Brook Bridge is the only covered bridge remaining in the town of Stowe. In 1969 the residents of the town adopted a resolution which directs the selectmen to provide "perpetual maintenance" of the bridge.<sup>3</sup>

The covered bridges of Vermont are among its most cherished and symbolic historic resources. About one hundred of the bridges still stand in the state, the highest concentration by area of covered bridges in the United States.<sup>4</sup> Many of these bridges have been altered only slightly, and many relate to other structures and villagescapes to form a unique historic environment. Recently, however, various forces have caused drastic changes in the state. The covered bridges have become subject to increasingly intense and detrimental effects of those changes. The Vermont Division of Historic Sites, therefore, wishes to extend the recognition and protection of the National Register of Historic Places to a majority of the remaining covered bridges.
