Tanner Construction Company for an estimated \$150,000. With several other highway Maintenance Project 107) came from an enormous public relief bill passed by Congress in 1935, a portion of which was earmarked for grade eliminations. The Winslow Underpass had been engineered late in 1935 by the AHD bridge department projects underway, the Phoenix contractor was slow in beginning the underpass, and the work dragged through the summer. Following WPA guidelines, Tanner recruited heavily from the relief roles for labor, using about 70,000 man-hours to Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad over U.S. 87 at Winslow, in Coconino County. 


