The Old Hartwick Village Cemetery (a.k.a. Robinson cemetery) is located about a half-mile south of the hamler of Hartwick on CR 11 in the Town of Hartwick, Otsego County, New York. The roughly square, .7-acre plot (tax parcel no.160.00-1-31.00) occupies a knoll adjacent to the east side of the highway. It commands a sweeping view of the Otego Creek valley, including the hamlet of Hartwick, up the valley to the north.
The lot is surrounded by fallow open land. It is bounded on its west line by CR 11. North and south, the land falls away to more open fields; easterly, it descends to the creek about a half-mile away. The property line is marked by a scrubby hedgerow of mainly young, mainly deciduous trees. A few additional trees of varying age are dotted throughout the cemetery, but these do not appear to have been intentionally planted. While the property is mown and soldiers' graves are marked, the overall appearance suggests benign neglect rather than assiduous care. A few stones have fallen; others are propped by iron bars or wrapped in iron straps. Some burials recorded in the mid-1900s are no longer apparent.
There are approximately 300 documented burials. Those with stones (more than 235) are almost all marked individually with slab stones with either squared heads or "bedstead" tops. Those of the latter type are concentrated in the western part of the lot, nearer the highway. These stones are arranged in generally regular rows running north-south; the markers face east and are inscribed on their west faces. Comparatively few markers provide more than simple recitations of birth, death, age upon demise, and the briefest delineation of family relationship. Many burials retain small footstones. There are fewer than ten obelisk markers interspersed throughout; most of these note more than one burial.
The markers date from the late 1790s through ca.1880, with the majority from the period ca.1825 to 1865. Earlier stones are carved from sandstone or slate. Soft marble and sandstone predominate in later burials. In general, the stones are weathered, a number to the point of illegibility, either by the action of erosion or acidity,

or in the case of the slate stones, by the splitting of sedimentary layers through many seasons of freeze-thaw
cycles. Many stones incorporate decorative motifs. Most common are willow trees, and urns; corners are
embellished with simple compass-scribed motifs, such as stars and invected corners. Later square-headed

stones, almost all weathered marble examples, and a few individual and family obelisks mark graves dating

through the 1880s. There are a few turn-of-the-century granite memorials. Except for the obvious effects of

weather and neglect, the cemetery retains a high degree of integrity to the period of significance.

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The Old Hartwick Village Cemetery (a.k.a. Robinson Cemetery) is significant for its association with the early
settlement and growth of the hamlet of Hartwick and as an intact and representative example of an early
community cemetery in the area of central New York State settled soon after the American Revolution by New
England outmigrants. As such, it provides important information about the lives of hamlet residents from the
earliest period through its major period of use at the end of the nineteenth century. The cemetery was in use by
the late 1790s, when the plot was set aside as the main location for burying residents of the developing hamlet
of Hartwick, located about one-half mile farther north on CR 11, and nearby farms. The largest proportion of
burials dates from the 1820s through the early 1860s. With the opening of a new cemetery adjacent to the north
side of the hamlet by the late 1860s, this cemetery gradually went out of use by 1900, although there are a few
later burials. Gravemarkers exhibit motifs typical of those used in the first half of the nineteenth century,
including willow trees, and urns, and corners are embellished with simple compass-scribed motifs, such as stars
and invected corners. Later square-headed stones, almost all weathered marble examples, and a few individual
and family obelisks mark graves dating through the 1880s. There are also a few turn-of-the-century granite
memorials. The Old Hartwick Village Cemetery is among the earliest community burying grounds in the Town
of Hartwick and in much of Otsego County; thus it provides important information about the region's first
settlers. This cemetery is nominated in conjunction with the Hartwick Historic District, which encompasses
much of the nearby hamlet. Although hamlet and cemetery have an intimate historic relationship, they are not

The hamlet of Hartwick lies in the northwest corner of the Town of Hartwick, which roughly follows the boundary of the Hartwick Patent, set aside in 1754. The linear hamlet developed along the stretch of road where the east-west route to the county seat at Cooperstown crossed the East Branch of the Otego Creek to join the old highway paralleling the west bank of the Otego Creek. Much of the early hamlet settlement faced onto the latter route, but during the first decades of the nineteenth century, the east-west highway, called Main Street by the

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mid-1800s, assumed increasing commercial importance. The siting of the Old Hartwick Village burying ground
suggests more than a simple setting aside of ground unsuited to ploughing. The knoll has an eastern exposure
desirable for burials in this period, when the dead were interred with their heads to the west. At the second
coming, they would simply sit up in their coffins, facing east—the direction where Christ was expected to

appear. Possibly as important, the knoll had a clear view of the developing hamlet to the north, where the living relations of those buried still lived and labored. This made a visual tie between the hamlet and its own small

necropolis—a reminder of the inevitable and a link between the quick and the dead.

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Although the hamlet had two churches by about 1810, neither apparently had its own graveyard. On the east side of the creek, the Baptists built their first meeting house in 1795 at the T-junction where the highway ran south from Main Street, more than a mile from the cemetery. Until the mid-1800s, the Baptist meeting house was the visual east end of the hamlet. On the west side of the creek, where Main Street met the north-south highway (now CR 11), the Congregationalists built their meeting house soon after establishing their society in 1800 at a spot about one-half mile north of the cemetery. By 1810, this group was renamed Presbyterian following the Act of Union. Amasa Peters (1768-1820), who came from Warren, Connecticut, reputedly gave the land for both the cemetery and the latter meeting house, but it is also said that he did not arrive in the town until 1800, and the first burials predate the turn of the century. Since no documentation concerning the cemetery's ownership, past or present, has been uncovered, this statement cannot be proved.

The earliest clearly marked grave belongs to Benjamin Fuller, who died in 1797 at age 65.² The surrounding land opened for settlement less than a decade earlier, and this evidence shows that Fuller had moved to

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Hartwick not as a young man but a middle-aged one. He was, judging by the ages of several people interred here before 1825, not very unusual. Infant burials are fairly common throughout the entire use period of the cemetery: one dated 1795 was recorded in the mid-1900s but not found later on. Illegible inscriptions and fallen stones now hidden under a layer of grass or moss have consigned some burials, especially early ones, to at least temporary oblivion. Early stones—especially ones belonging to families who continued west rather than staying in Hartwick—may have been taken by later residents as dressed stone is useful for purposes other than marking graves. This may account for deaths recorded in Baptist and Presbyterian records not being physically represented in the graveyard.
Other names found in early deeds for property in the nearby hamlet are also found in the cemetery. The earliest
is Rufus Thrall, who died at age 39 in 1798. His son, Freeborn—who built the large stone house opposite the
Baptist Church and opened North Street for development—and daughter-in-law, Maria, buried infants Taryette
Amelia and Theodore Leverett in 1835 and 1845. Freeborn and Maria left Hartwick before they died and are
not buried here. Others prominent in the growth of the hamlet buried here include Amasa Peters (d.1829, age
52) and his wife, Sarah Swift Peters (d.1820), their son Rufus (d.1841, age 39) and their only daughter, Ellen
Jennett (d.1845). Amasa was a prominent landowner who established many early businesses and is said to have
given the land for the cemetery itself. Rufus built the Greek Revival cottage known locally as the Peters
Mansion (15 Earl's Road) and also speculated in land and construction. Lyman Harrington (d.1850, age 67),
who built the large Greek Revival house on the south side of Main Street, and his wife, Emily Wentworth
(d.1857, age 60), whose relations owned the hotel (still standing) on Main Street during the 1830s and 1840s, lie
in the cemetery. The location of the grave of Lyman's partner in the hardware business, Robert Church, is
unknown, but the resting place of his infant son, Lawrence (d.1829), is located here.
what she could located later. Still more recently, a list has been compiled again and presented on line. The former provides some additional information about family relationships; the latter is alphabetical, but more abbreviated.
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The families of other early business owners are also represented. Lavina Chapman (d.1833, age 76), who, with
her husband, owned the ashery and water rights on the Otego Creek, is buried here. The grave of Ellen Cook
(d.1835, age 78), wife of Comfort Cook, whose house is located at the east end of the hamlet on Main Street, is
identified, although her husband's is not. Their neighbor, hatter Nathan Chappell (d.1856, age 67), and his wife,
Esther (d.1858, age 72), are here. So also is Abner Alger (d.1840, age 77), co-owner with William Alger of the
distillery located south of Main Street and east of the creek. William Alworth (d.1839, age 75), a cooper who
came from Dutchess County in 1823, and his wife, Dinah (d.1830, age 69), both rest here. The Eldreds (early
owners of the Main Street hotel known in the period as the Eldred House) and the Conklins, hotel owners on the
Brooklyn side of the creek, are also represented.

Several landowners noted on the 1856 map were later interred in this cemetery. Names include Adam Grover (d.1857, age 77) and both of his wives, Mehitable (d.1828, age 44) and Ruth (d.1841, age 53); Juddah Ashcraft (d.1885, age 73) and his wife, Hannah (d.1887, age 71), along with three infants (Orville, d.1841; Theodore, d.1844; and Mary, d.1849) and a 19-year-old daughter (Elvenah, d.1856). The Robinsons, whose surname is frequently used to identify this cemetery today, buried at least fourteen family members here. Solomon (d.1865, age 83) owned land east of the creek in the settlement period. He and his wife, Altheda Learned (d.1859, age 70), interred two young daughters, Permila (d.1815, age 22) and Lucinda (d.1820, age 14), nearby. Benjamin Skiff, one of the original purchasers from William Cooper of the land where the hamlet developed, was laid to rest in 1812 at age 85. This advanced age shows he was past 60 when he bought his Hartwick property.

The list of burials might also be used to detect patterns among the hamlet's residents in this period. More than eighty of the known burials mark the graves of people who lived past age 65. Sixty more mark infant (under age 3) interments. Forty women of child-bearing age are buried here, which is not so many more than men of

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	,	if married, were buried under their husbands' names, but some rican Revolution and another died in the Civil War.

The old graveyard afforded a final resting place for many hamlet residents into the 1880s and 1890s, even after the newer ground was opened on the north side of the hamlet. The new ground was also not associated with a specific church. By the early twentieth century, with a few exceptions, Hartwick people buried their dead there instead, leaving this necropolis, with its nineteenth-century appearance and record of the hamlet's earliest settlement, virtually intact.




