Buildings like this are found in almost every Georgia town and reflect an evolutionary modernization of the standard late Victorian commercial building. In its pier and panel wall system and its industrial sash it also reflects some awareness of early 20th century "modern" architecture, even if just its barest functional aspects. It is one of two historic buildings of its type in Clarkesville.
