The Maria Bauer Homestead Ranch is situated in a small clearing among the forested hills west of the City of Custer in northern Custer County about two miles south of U. S. Highway 16. Designated as Homestead Entry Survey (H.E.S.) No. 355, marked by metes and bounds, the ranch consists of 14 buildings, of which 10 are contributing resources.

The resources are:

- 1. House, (contributing), circa 1917. Located approximately 15 meters west of the former route of Pass Creek Road, the house is a story-and-a-half, rectangular building resting on mortared rubblestone footings. The wood frame house is clad with shake shingles and vertical plank siding. Asphalt shingles cover the main gable roof, the rear shed-roofed addition, and the hipped-roof wrap-around porch. Fenestration includes regularly-spaced windows and doors.
- 2. Barn, (contributing), circa 1917. The barn is a rectangular log building clad with board-and-batten siding. It rises directly from a log sill. Corners are fitted with square notches. Several varieties of chinking are visible. Log timbers support the second floor hay loft. A leantu wraps the building on the north and east facades. The building is capped by a tincovered gable roof.
- 3. Storage Shed, (noncontributing), n.d. The one-story rectangular shed was built as a teacher's residence and originally located near the Bull Flats School. In the 1950s, it was moved to the ranch. The building is now located west of the house and rests directly on the ground. Tar paper and vertical plank siding cover the wood frame walls, and asphalt paper covers the flat roof.
- 4. Privy, (contributing), circa 1917. Located next to the storage shed (no. 3), the privy is a square wood frame building clad with vertical and horizontal plank siding. Wood shingles and a corrugated tin panel cover the gable roof.
- 5. Storage Shed, (contributing), circa 1917. The rectangular, one-story storage shed rests on unmortared concrete blocks. Clad with vertical plank siding, the wood frame shed is capped by a gable roof covered with corrugated tin panels.
- 6. Chicken Coop, (noncontributing), n.d. The log chicken coop was originally the Bull Flats School and was moved to its present location in the 1950s. It is built of hand-hewn log walls with double-vertical corner notching. The log walls are chinked with small wood slats and concrete. Corrugated tin panels cover the shed roof.

- 7. Chicken Coop, (contributing), circa 1917-1940. Located just to the east of the old Bull Flats School (no. 6), the one-story rectangular chicken coop is a wood frame building clad with vertical and horizontal plank siding. Corrugated tin panels cover the shed roof.
- 8. Chicken Coop, (contributing), circa 1917-1940. The wood frame building is sheathed with asphalt paper. Corrugated tin panels cover the shed roof.
- 9. Storage Shed, (contributing), circa 1917-1940. Located to the north of the house, the rectangular, one-story storage shed is a wood frame building clad with vertical plank siding and capped by an asphalt-shingled shed roof.
- 10. Cellar, (contributing), circa 1917. Located southwest of the house is an earthen cellar with a gable-roofed log entrance.
- 11. Privy, (contributing), circa 1939 The newest privy on the ranch, this building was constructed by the relief project workers during the Great Depression. Typical of such privies, the building is of wood frame construction with drop siding and a shed roof that features a wide overhang and a wide facia board.
- 12. Garage, (noncontributing), circa 1950. Clad with horizontal plank siding and capped by a corrugated tin-covered gable roof, the wood frame garage is built into a hillside on the south and west facades.
- 13. Granary, (noncontributing), n.d. Constructed originally as a teacher's house and moved to the ranch in 1949, the granary is located to the northeast of the house. Resting on the ground, the building features vertically notched log walls that are chinked with concrete and small wood slats. The gable roof is clad with tin roofing panels.
- 14. Sheep Shed, (contributing), circa 1917-1942. Rising directly from the ground, the sheep shed features log walls with rough vertical and square corner notching and wood slat chinking. Asphalt paper covers the gable roof.


A variety of wood fencing is attached to several of the outbuildings. Deciduous and conifer trees dot the ranch complex.

Under Criterion A of the National Register Criteria, the Maria Bauer Homestead Ranch is significant in the area of Exploration/Settlement, because it is a well-preserved example of homestead ranches in northern and central Custer County. It contains a variety of resource types common to historic ranches in the region and illustrates the life of a working ranch in the Black Hills region. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan, the nominated property relates to the following contexts: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement, A. Claim Era; and IV.C. Farm and Ranch Structures.

According to the Sioux Winter Count, the Oglala Teton Sioux arrived in the Black Hills of South Dakota in 1775 and drove the Kiowa tribe from that re-Nearly 100 years later in 1874, rumors of gold in the Black Hills were confirmed by an expedition led by Lt. Colonel George A. Custer. Although the region was closed to non-Indian settlement by the 1868 Laramie Treaty, news of gold spurred white prospectors to rush into the Black Hills, many of them settling in the area now known as Custer County. On August 10, 1875 a group of miners met and organized Custer City. The county of Custer was established two years later, after the U.S. Government acquired the Black Hills and opened it to settlement. A flow of permanent agricultural settlers followed the wave of miners into the region. Around the turn of the century, the government began issuing homestead patents, under provisions of the Homestead Act of 1862, on parcels of Custer County land. In return for fee simple patent to 160 acres of government land, this law required a homesteader to reside on the land for 5 years and to pay a nominal filing fee. Most ranch claims in the northern and central parts of the county were acquired through the Homestead Act.

Maria Bauer officially acquired her ranch (H.E.S. no. 355), the property nominated here, on 9 May 1917. The only known surviving record of Maria Bauer is her patent on this property. Few unaltered homestead houses remain in the Black Hills region. The Maria Bauer homestead house was constructed as a two-room rectangular pen plan with an informal entrance and an open wrap-around porch. The log barn and most of the outbuildings, too, are nearly unaltered historic resources. As a whole the Bauer Ranch represents the development of ranching in Custer County and the types of resources commonly found at the region's ranches. It further illustrates typical growth of ranch infrastructure over time. The house and barn have remained virtually unchanged since the present owner acquired the property in 1949.

The period of significance of the Maria Bauer Homestead Ranch extends from its founding in circa 1917 to 1942, the established fifty-year cut-off date for the National Register.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION: The nominated property is bounded by a set of imaginary lines that intersect to form a rectangle around the property. The northern boundary line lies 80 meters north of the north wall of the house (resource no. 1) and runs parallel to that wall. The eastern boundary line lies 80 meters east of the east wall of the house and runs parallel to that wall. The southern boundary line lies 40 meters south of the south wall of the house and runs parallel to that wall. The western boundary line lies 40 meters west of the west wall of the house and runs parallel to that wall. The property is located in the southeast quarter of the southeast quarter of Section 8, Township 4 South, Range 3 East, Black Hills Meridian, in Custer County, South Dakota.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION: The boundary lines of the nominated property are set to include all features of the ranch complex, but to exclude pasture land and any unrelated private or public features.
