Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Description

Today this clapboarded structure consists of a four-bay main block measuring $40' \times 22'$ and two rear additions. The block includes off-center door, gable roof, and two interior chimneys in the end position. It is flanked by porches on either side.

The northern portion of the main block is the original 1676 garrison, which measured 32' by 22'. It is framed with gunstock posts and has walls of 2" vertical plank, partly lined with 3" plank; old accounts state that the walls were also infilled with brick for added protection. Evidence of small window openings exist in the wall sheathing. The original north chimney was replaced with the present one early this century.

The southern portion of the main block was added circa 1730-1751. It retains a chimney serving four fireplaces, structural members, and casings of posts and beams.

The $l\frac{1}{2}$ -story rear addition was constructed circa 1810 and retains its interior wainscot and trim and more modern fireplace with beehive oven built inside the original fireplace. The larger addition was built around 1880 and includes a porch with stickwork detailing.

Central heat was added in the 1911 modernization, which also included the addition of trim over earlier fabric. Over the years plumbing, heating, and wiring have been modernized, as have sash, doors, and hardware. More recently, however, later additions have been removed to expose older features.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

In the later half of the 17th century "safe" houses were found in many areas of New Hampshire. These dwellings were fortified to repel attack and when this defense function was no longer necessary, the structures were modified into more conventional residential types and altered according to changing tastes and technology.

The Sewall Garrison is one of the few remaining "safe" houses in the state which is still on its original site. Most of its structural members and some interior fittings remain intact. It is a good illustration of the way in which these early structures have been modified to fit varying needs and conditions over the years. In this way it constitutes a cumulative record of building during the last three hundred years. Additionally, the Sewall Garrison occupies a site on the Park Street Common and is important to the historical, architectural, and visual composition of the area.
