Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Gourley's Opera House is located on the north side of Second Street (Highway 20), midway on the block between Loofborrow and Sprague Streets. Built in 1914, the One-Part Commercial Block structure with its false front was originally next to Dave Gourley's electric light plant and was one of the first buildings electrified in Rushville. The brick structure is approximately 50 feet wide by 80 feet long. It has a peaked tin roof; the false front has panels inset between columns of brick. Entrance to the theatre is through a broad entrance similar in style to a movie house, with a box office and refreshment counter added during the theatre's later tenure as a moving picture theatre. "Plains" remains faintly visible on the movie-style marquee now attached to the front of the building.

The auditorium is 41 feet long from the proscenium opening to the back wall of the main floor. The balcony extends 19 feet further behind the main auditorium, its edge delineated by a wall approximately three feet high. It includes a projection booth in the center rear. Both the auditorium and balcony are raked, furnished with comfortable permanent opera seats. Stairs to the balcony are on either side of the auditorium, against the outside walls. The lower floor, beneath the auditorium, has an exceptional wooden floor; this area was used extensively for dances and roller skating, making this opera house unlike any others extant in Nebraska, in that it used two venues to fulfill all its functions. The *Rushville Recorder* for 28 Aug. 1914, praised the theatre as

... a handsome, comfortable and modern structure, fitted up with electric lights, fans, ventilators, and opera chairs. The scenery is well painted and the Italian garden scene is beautiful, and worthy of any metropolitan theatre. The scenery was painted by the Kansas City Scenic Co., and includes two handsome drop curtains, one containing advertisements of the business houses and one an ordinary curtain drop, with effective landscape. The seats are comfortable and sloped at such an angle that any one from any part of the house can see the stage.

Diagonal wings, added when the opera house became a movie house exclusively, disguise the original squared corners. It has an attractive tin ceiling showing some water damage.

The proscenium arch measures 26 feet wide by approximately 13 feet high; ample wings of 11 feet, 3 inches fill each side of the slightly raked stage. Access to the backstage area from the auditorium is through broad doors on either side of the auditorium in the proscenium wall. The stage measures 17 feet, 6 inches from the curtain line to the back wall; it has a three-foot apron curving outward from the arch, which features a footlight trough.


The structural and historical integrity of the building and theatre has been preserved.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Gourley's Opera House is significant for its association with and in reference to the historic context "Aesthetic Systems: Itinerant and Local Performing Arts in Nebraska" and the property type of "Opera House Buildings in Nebraska, 1867 to 1917." Under Criterion A, this opera house is significant in the areas of the performing arts; entertainment/recreation; and social history, on a state level, as a well preserved example of an opera house building in Nebraska. The building retains a high degree of historical integrity, possessing the physical and associative characteristics to make it an eligible member of its property type.

This opera house is significant in the area of performing arts for bringing a variety of entertainment to the community of Rushville. As a facility for the performing arts, it offered productions such as touring stock companies, musical concerts, and home talent productions. (See following table of Representative Entertainments 1914-1917.)

This opera house is significant in the area of entertainment/recreation, since it provided a place where the whole community could gather to attend dances and moving pictures. (See following table of Representative Entertainments 1914-1917.)

This opera house is significant in the area of social history, because it gave Rushville a neutral, nonaffiliated location for Memorial Day and other civic services. (See following table of Representative Entertainments 1914-1917.) In the days before radio, television, and sound movies, activities at the opera house were anticipated for days or weeks ahead of time. It provided a place for people to get together to have a good time and forget their troubles over crops, weather, taxes, the railroads, and the generally hard life of settling the Great Plains.

The period of significance is derived from the original construction date of the building, 1914, when Dave Gourley, the owner, was praised by the *Rushville Recorder* as an enterprising citizen ... who has given the town two such considerable improvements—electric lights and an up—to—date theatre" (28 Aug. 1914). The period of significance continues through 1917, the year considered to signal the end of the opera house era in Nebraska, based on declining numbers of touring companies nationally and rising numbers of movie houses and automobiles. Gradually the Gourley Theatre catered solely to entertainment/recreation activities such as dances and movies.
