DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Oddfellows Hall is a two-story buff brick building with terra cotta details. First story pilasters demarcate the structure's 3 bays, each of which contains a store. A round arched entry with a fanlight transom is embellished by a scrolled plaque with the order's traditional triple chain and eye icons. The lodge hall occupies the second floor. Each bay contains a set of three double hung sash windows with clear glass transoms and capped piers. Terra cotta band moldings run the length of the facade above and below these windows. Three smaller framed windows with keystones are interspersed among the others. The most distinguished of these is an oval stained glass window. The building terminates with a modest denticulated cornice and a brick parapet.

The only alterations to this building have affected the first story facade, with an awning secured by gables being the most obtrusive addition. The left bay was added in 1909 for the Citizens National Bank, which accounts for the unsymmetric arrangement of the second story's smaller windows.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Oddfellows Hall is architecturally significant in Salmon for its good applied ornamentation which makes it one of the best examples of the neo-classical revival style in the town. Its clean design further accentuates the modest stained glass window and the plaque over the entry, and makes the building an integral part of the Salmon streetscape.

Allan Merritt was a local architect practicing from the turn of the century and was responsible for designing much of the downtown area. He later became Idaho's state highway engineer.
