#### NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The historic main picnic area (photos 1 and 2) lies at the end of the forest road that runs northeast off SR250, southeast of Brownstown in Jackson-Washington (formerly Jackson) State Forest. Also called the Knob Lake Upper Picnic Area, it nestles in a grove of oaks on a hillside to the north of Knob Lake (formerly Sawmill Lake). by a parking area on the west, the grove is accessible by way of two sets of stone steps set into the hillside. At the bottom of the northernmost steps is a water fountain beneath a timber shelter (photo The grove features an oven shelter (photo 2), a typical New Dealera recreational feature, which is comprised of a two-sided stone fireplace centered within an open shelter topped with a hipped roof. The only other substantial construction is a circular stone platform-or campfire ring--with a fireplace oven built into the wall that partially surrounds it (photo 3). Within the circle is a stone-andtimber picnic table. (The table and bench supports are constructed of stone: the table top and seats are 2x10s, which presumably have been replaced in many cases.) In addition, there are eighteen more of these picnic tables scattered about the grove, along with five individual fireplace ovens of stone (photos 4.5). In every case, each oven is grouped with two of the picnic tables. On the east side of the grove is a modern vault toilet that presumably replaced an earlier facility of similar type. A service road that enters the grove at its southeast corner becomes an unobtrusive cinder lane within the picnic area.

The site contains six contributing resources: the oven shelter, the stone platform (with table), the drinking fountain shelter, two sets of stone steps, and the site itself, which includes eighteen stone—and—timber picnic tables and five stone fireplace ovens. The vault toilet is a non-contributing resource.

#### NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Nestled amidst an oak grove on a hillside to the northwest above the former Sawmill Lake in the midst of Jackson-Washington State Forest, the property's main picnic grove is a marvelously intact example of state forest recreational development by the Civilian Conservation Corps in Indiana. As such, it offers a splendid material record of an important area of New Deal public works and recreational development on Indiana state lands during the 1930s. Although there was less emphasis on recreational development in the state forests, shelters and picnic areas were typical of the projects on these properties.

As described in the associated property type "New Deal work projects related to recreational activities," the picnic area is eliqible for the National Register under Criterion A in the areas of recreation and social history because it is associated with the New Deal's work programs and recreational development in the 1930s. It is also eligible under Criterion C because the site as a whole, and its individual resources: the oven shelter, the campfire ring, the picnic tables, and the fountain shelter, all are representative of the work and style of architecture and site development typical of the CCC. picnic area meets the standards of integrity as set forth in the multiple property nomination "New Deal Resources on Indiana State Lands." The site remains in its original location and original setting--or more accurately, its original setting come to fruition. The design and materials remain intact, and the resources are representative of and associated with typical CCC workmanship--timber construction and stone masonry.

The state had only recently acquired (1930) Jackson State Forest near Brownstown, when CCC Company 1556 established a forestry camp there in 1933. They immediately set to work planting trees and building access roads. Within two years they had constructed a service building, a large barn, sawmill and lumber shed, a dam to impound a small lake that provided a source of water, a museum out of a reassembled pioneer cabin, two shelter houses, and the picnic area under discussion.

While a number of CCC-constructed picnic areas survive in various state forests, this one is unusually intact. Unlike most picnic areas of this size, it features no large shelter house (although there is one nearby across the parking lot and up a hill), only an oven shelter, a popular recreational structure during the New Deal years (none were built before or since in Indiana). The stone platform, which Division of Forestry personnel call a fire ring, also appears to have been built only during the New Deal years. Most large picnic areas in Indiana's state forests had one--but only one. (Interestly, no example of this type of resource has materialized in any state park.) Those extani today are too frequently in a very deteriorated state. The oaks that define the picnic area appear to have been planted about the same time as the site's construction. Although documentation is lacking for this site, the CCC is known to have planted some hardwoods as well as the ubiquitous white pines, and similar sites in other state forests are also marked by oak trees of 1930s vintage.


### GEOGRAPHICAL DATA
