#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Mathias Sharp House is dramatically sited on a bluff overlooking the Ohio River (see Photo #3). The Italianate residence is said to have been designed by a Cincinnati architect, although his name is not recorded. The house has brick bearing walls throughout, and is generally cross-shaped with the west arm of the cross being one story, and the other three being two stories high. In order to take advantage of its superb site, the main facade of the house faces the bluff to the east (Photo #1); the main entrance, however, faces the street to the west (Photo #2).

The main entrance is located in the one-story portion of the house, and is sheltered by a small, ornate porch. The door itself is surrounded by sidelights and a transom. Single windows flank the entrance; a short window is centered over the porch, just beneath the jerkinhead roof. Flanking this wing are porches, the one on the left, or north, an open porch with detailing like that of the main entrance, and the one on the south having been enclosed some time ago to make a bathroom.

The riverside facade features a two-story central pavilion in advance of the two longer wings. All three sections have jerkinhead gables. The central pavilion features a projecting bay window on the ground floor. Ornate porches fill the intersections of the central pavilion with the rest of the house. The longer wings have two bays each; the central pavilion has one.

Detailing on the house includes, in addition to the porches, simple entablatures over the windows, stone sills, and an ornate cornice with brackets spaced intermittently among recessed panels. Windows are new, and duplicate the original six-over-six or six-over-nine configurations.

Inside the main entrance, a walnut staircase rises to the second floor. The ceiling of the second floor hall is vaulted. Each major room has a fireplace (eight in all) with iron mantels in the main rooms, and wooden in the secondary rooms. One iron mantel was replaced by a golden oak mantel in the living room, following a fire. Between the living room and the parlour, elaborate golden oak fretwork was installed to match the oak mantel. Window and door frames, baseboards, and doors are heavily molded and of poplar.

A new garage also stands on the property.

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The Mathias Sharp House is a finely proportioned and well-preserved example of the Italianate style. Its prominent siting on a bluff overlooking the Ohio River makes it a well-recognized landmark.

The early history of Spencer County is poorly documented so that Mathias Sharp, builder of the house, remains a somewhat shadowy figure. Originally from New Jersey, Sharp probably emigrated to this area early enough—probably soon after the War of 1812—to secure a large tract of bottom land along the Ohio River. He successfully farmed his holdings and probably speculated in land, becoming, by 1842, "a prominent citizen of the county."<sup>1</sup> He was wealthy enough to invest in a private academy and to import a painter from Cincinnati, who rendered portraits of him and his wife, Mary, in 1852.

Mary Sharp died on February 9, 1854. Sharp, on December 22, 1855, married Catherine Shumaker, a girl some 44 years his junior. Catherine was the daughter of a nearby farmer, who had helped nurse Mary Sharp during her last illness. Family tradition holds that Sharp built the house for Catherine, although construction did not take place until 1867. Sharp died mysteriously in 1869. Sometime between July and December, 1870, Catherine married Samuel T. Batchelor, who worked in a general merchandise store in Rockport. On April 12, 1871, however, he too died under suspicious circumstances, suggesting poisoning. Catherine was arrested, tried for the crime, and acquitted of the charges. The trial was possibly the most sensational event in southern Indiana during the period.

Needing money for her defense, Catherine turned to John Eigenmann, who paid for the defense but in exchange took possession of the house. Born in 1837 in Germany, Eigenmann settled among Rockport's large German-born population in 1857. He entered the Union Army at the outbreak of the Civil War. After suffering injury and captivity, he returned to Rockport in 1863-64 and resumed his business as a contractor and builder. He also owned Pearl Mills in Rockport, which dealt in grain, flour, and feed. He was one of Rockport's most important and substantial late 19th century citizens. Eigenmann, then his son, occupied the house until 1900. Thereafter, it was rented to various individuals until sold in 1913 to Francis Blackburn Posey. Although he lived there for only two years, Posey's descendants owned the house until it was purchased by the Wilkinsons in 1981.

A part of Fractional Section 26, Township 7 South, Range 6 West, in the City of Rockport, better described as follows: Beginning on a line dividing two pieces of land sold by William R. Hynes to Amanda Pitcher and Benjamin Romine, on the East side of the road leading from Seminary Street to the lower landing in Romine's Addition to the Town (now City) of Rockport; thence North 85 feet; thence East to a perpendicular bluff of rock; thence South 125 feet; thence West to the East side of the above mentioned road; thence North 40 feet to the place of beginning.
