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SCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANC

The Minnesota State Capitol building stands on a hill just north of the St. Paul business district. The building faces south, toward the Mississippi River, and overlooks a beautifully landscaped mall.

The Captiol is a rectangular building 433'x120', with a central wing at the north or rear measuring approximately 106'x108'. It is constructed of greyish-white Georgia marble supported by a structure of steel; the foundation, broad terraces, exterior ballustrades and steps are of grey Minnesota granite. The simple rustication of the basement and first floors together with the marked storiation between the first and second floors set the lower portion apart, forming a base for the Corinthian proportions of the floors above. Flattened glass domes add interest to the roof line near the end of each wing.

The south or front elevation has a central prostyle portico comprised of three arched doorways, above which is an open loggia extending through the third story. The entablature supported by the columns of the loggia is decorated with six statues representing the virtues of wisdom, courage, bounty, truth, integrity, and prudence. Above the entablature rises a square pedestal crowned by a guilded quadriga entitled "The Progress of the State".

Directly behind the quadriga and ascending from the Capitol's center is the self-supported marble dome, 89 feet in diameter. The dome is surrounded by pairs of Corinthian columns, each supporting the statue of an eagle, and is interrupted by pedimented windows. The columned circular lantern is topped by a gold ball.

Sixteen varieties of marble, both domestic and European, as well as polished Kasota limestone and granite from Minnesota are used in the Capitol interior. Ceilings and wall panels are hand painted with arabesques representing the various fruits, grains, and vegetables grown in the state. The dominant colors are ivory, gold, blue and rose.

Upon entering the Capitol one is immediately confronted with the heavy marble piers and arches of the rotunda and the large glass star in a framework of brass inserted in the limestone and marble floor directly under the dome. A marble ballustrade highlights the second floor rotunda. The dome is a great blue and gold vault with an Austrian beaded glass electrolier six feet in diameter suspended from its center. Four murals showing the "Civilization of the Northwest" decorate the pendentives.

The grand stairwells to the east and west of the rotunda are executed in combinations of marble and lighted by superb vaulted skylights. Eighteen columns of Italian marble surround each second floor stairwell. High up in the base of the skylight vaults over the stairwells twelve lunettes symbolize the various activities and industries of the state.

The second or "grand floor" of the Capitol contains the chambers of the Second or "grand floor" of the Capitol contains the chambers of the Senate the House of Representatives and the Supreme Court. The square Senate thamber in the west wing is lighted with a dome. The cornice is supported by French marble columns in a dull pink. Pendentives between the soches opening to the spectators gallery are decorated with figures of Freedom, Courage, Justice, and Equality. Lunettes decorate the north and south walks.

The semicircular House Chamber in the north wing has a half dome

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## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Minnesota State Capitol building has been a silent witness to the unfolding of the state's political history since the 34th Legislature convened there nearly nine years after ground breaking ceremonies on May 6, 1896. An excellent example of Classic Revival architecture, the Capitol is clearly the most perfectly executed monumental public building in the entire state. This gleaming white marble structure boasts the largest self-supporting marble dome in the world.

The Capitol was the first building of such size and importance designed by Cass Gilbert, and it is obvious to the most casual observer that Gilbert's professional integrity and high regard for the standards set by the great buildings in architectural history prevented him from sacrificing quality and craftsmanship in favor of economy. Gilbert and the other artists engaged to decorate the structure-- Daniel Chester French, John LaFarge, Elmer Gangeey, Edwin H. Blashfield, and Edward Simmons, made up a Board of Design, which insured that the final result of their efforts would be harmonious and of the utmost, quality. To Gilbert there was "...nothing more worthless than bad art." The paintings and sculpture are all timeless works of art and the artists won the highest recognition for their work. The painting entitled "The Battle of Nashville yoy Howard Pyle, located on the north wall of the Governor's Reception Room, is considered by many art critics the greatest war painting of its time.

A tour of the Minnesota State Capitol is truely one of the most worthwhile educational experiences available to the public. Adults and children alike learn of the political history of the state as well as present political procedure by touring the rooms where the laws are made and judged. In addition they receive a lesson in eclectic architecture and study the masterpieces of famous artists, many of whose works decorate our national buildings and monuments in Washington D.C.

Cass Gilbert believed that "...unless a work stands the test of time, its merit is doubtful." The merit of the Minnesota State Capitol is evident after 66 years of service to the people.

ceiling penetrated by five great arches opening into spectator galleries. It is lighted by an elaborate skylight surrounded by a broad frieze. The walls, originally painted a dull green, are now covered with a red wallpaper.

The Supreme Court Chamber in the east wing resembles the Senate Chamber in shape and is also lighted with a dome. The Justices! bench opposite the door is backed by four Ionic columns of white Vermont marble. Recessed lunettes at the upper portions of the walls contain paintings with appropriate themes.

Other rooms on the second floor include the Senate and House retiring rooms and the Justices' consultation room, all elaborately decorated. The Senate room is done in red marble, mahogany and gold, the House room resembles a 16th century French or Italian chateau, and the Justices' consultation room is a copy of the room in Independence Hall where the Declaration of Independence was signed.

The Governor's Reception Room is the most elaborate in the Capitol. The woodwork is dark white oak from Minnesota intricately decorated with ornaments of plaster covered with a dull gold, and the ceiling and cornice are patterned with dull gold leaf. The original mahogany furniture has been replaced with traditional furniture which fits the room's grandeur.

The remainder of the rooms on the first and third floors are state offices. The ground floor contains various committee rooms.

The Capitol has seen no exterior alteration and very little interior alteration since its construction. Between the 1967 and 1969 Legislative sessions many offices were paneled and modernized with complete disregard for the original spirit of the interior design. Fortunately, most of the indiscretions are found in private state offices which are not open to the general public. Modern elevators have been installed and successive remodelings on the ground level have somewhat changed its original appearance.
