ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT CONDITION: Late Victorian; one story on brick foundation, irregular floor plan, weatherboard frame construction, gable roof with diamond shaped asphalt shingles, central chimney, porch with gazebo on southeast corner and east side of house: details include gable ends with multi-paned stained glass windows and heavily decorated bargeboards with spoolwork, square bay windows on projecting wings with paired 1/1double hung sash windows, and heavily decorated porch with turned post balustrade, chamfered porch supports with braided carved wood applied to chamfers, lyre designed entablature, brackets, and carved crossettes; shed additions to rear; yard extensively landscaped (OVER)

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE (FROM ORIGINS TO PRESENT): The property on which this house sits was purchased in 1897 by W.T. Hall from I.I. Moses. The house was constructed by the Columbus Iron Works shortly thereafter. In 1904, R.E. Brooks purchased the house and lot. Brooks was a machinist at the Columbus Iron Works. The house has remained in the family since that time, passing to his wife upon his death at the Columbus Iron Works, and upon his wife's death, to his daughter, the present owner.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): ARCHITECTURE: This house is architecturally significant as the finest example of the Victorian Cottage in Phenix City. The gazebo porch, lyre patterned porch trimmings, chamfered posts with applied braid trim, and heavily decorated gables are unmatched in Phenix City. LOCAL HISTORY: Significant as the type of home being built by the construction division of the Columbus Ironworks, this house was lived in by a machinist at the Ironworks. It is representative of the type of housing popular among skilled craftsmen working in the Columbus industries, while living in Phenix City.
