Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Located on Highway 52 in the commercial section of Allardt, the Gernt Office was built in 1898 by Bruno Gernt for use as a land office. The rectangular-plan, commercial building is covered with weatherboard and has an asphalt shingle gable roof. A simple wood belt course is seen above the stone foundation. There is a single brick chimney at the ridgeline. In 1954, a storage building was erected on the property and, in 1964, an addition was appended to the rear of the office.

Facing south, the facade of the office is three bays wide. Two 2/2 double-hung sashes are located to the west of the single-leaf door, which is capped by a transom light. The half-hip roof porch is supported by three turned columns and two pilasters, ornamented with turned wood below the porch eaves, and has a wood porch floor. A plain frieze and a louvered opening are found in the gable end.

The east and west elevations of the original building are identical. Both have two 2/2 double-hung sashes. The east elevation of the addition contains one 2/2 double-hung sash, while the west elevation contains two smaller windows. Although the belt course continues around the addition, it has a concrete block foundation rather than a stone one. The north or rear elevation is composed of the addition, which is slightly lower in height than the original office. One single-leaf door and a 2/2 double-hung sash are found here.

The interior of the Gernt Office is divided into two rooms plus the addition. The walls are sided with beaded board and have a chair rail, cove molding, and baseboards. There is a built-in cabinet in the second room. All of the woodwork evinces fine craftsmanship and much of it is hand planed. Emil Steinert, who also worked on the Allardt Presbyterian Church, constructed the office building and was responsible for the interior trim. An original safe is still in the building. One window opening is visible on the wall in the second room that separates this room from the addition; it was once an exterior window.

North of the office, a one story storage building was erected in 1954. It has an asphalt shingle gable roof and is sided with concrete. Because it is less than fifty years old, it is non-contributing.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Gernt Office is being nominated under criteria A and B for its local significance in commerce and for its association with Bruno Gernt. The office was used by Gernt to manage the land sales that were responsible for the development of Allardt. It has continued to be used by family members as a business office. The building retains a high degree of integrity and meets the registration requirements of the multiple property form for Fentress County.

Bruno Gernt was born in Dresden, Germany, in 1851. He first emigrated to England, but, by the 1870s, he was in Michigan. Gernt helped provide financing to people buying land in Allardt and recruited emigrants from Germany. He began working with M. H. Allardt, for whom the town was named, but he joined with Alexander Stephens after Allardt's death. Stephens worked in their Cincinnati office, while Gernt was responsible for the office in the new community of Allardt.

Because of his involvement in land sales, Gernt helped to establish clear title to many of the areas that had been in dispute. In addition to his business activities, he supported the establishment of the first school in the community and recruited Max Colditz and Virgil Easley to teach there. Bruno Gernt's house was listed in the National Register in 1987, and it is also significant because of its association with Gernt. Both properties are equally important and reflect the influence that Gernt had on the community. During his lifetime, Gernt had a sidewalk built between his house and the office, a distance of about two-thirds of a mile, so that he could easily walk between them (the walk is no longer extant).

After Gernt's death in 1932, the office continued to be used for commercial enterprises by the family, the executors of the Estate of Bruno Gernt. Bruno's sons, Hugo and Arthur, were involved in the lumber industry and were pioneers in the oil industry during the early 1900s. They helped to organize mining interests in the Davidson-Wilder area of Fentress county and operated a store there. Since 1956, the office has been used by the

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Estate of Bruno Gernt, Inc. to manage their land, timber, and natural resources. Other companies or organizations that used the office include the Allardt Real Estate Association, from 1898 until 1933; Walter Gernt Lumber and Farms, from 1932 until 1965; the Gernt-Taylor Lumber Company, from 1948 until 1963; the Arthur Gernt Estate, Farms and Holdings, from 1950 until 1973; the Hugo Gernt Estate Holdings, from 1956 until 1973; the Gernt Lumber Company, from 1965 to the present; and the Allardt Cemetery Association, from 1928 to the present. Except for the Allardt Cemetery Association, these companies all involved Gernt family members.

The office is one of the few intact commercial buildings in the community. Two other commercial buildings are located in the proposed Youngs Historic District, but many of the stores or hotels in the town are no longer extant or are in unsound condition.
