The house has projecting eaves and an ornate ventilator grill in the gable. The entrance is in the central bay and has a transom above the door. The door is sheltered by a one-story porch.		35. 19. History In 1872 Edward D. Hobbs sold this property to John Webb for \$6,184.00 indicating that there was probably a house on the property. Hobbs more than likely designed and/or built the house. It is similar to JF-612 which Hobbs was responsible for.		36. Date 3 October 1979

Architects for the Tway House were Nevin, Morgan and Wischmeyer. This prominent Louisville architectural firm designed a number of noted local buildings in the Colonial and Georgian Revival styles.

The house was important as the main house for Plainview Farms, a large dairy farm and local landmark and as the home of R.C. Tway, president of R.C. Tway Coal Company.
