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extensive prairie. . . , the base of the Mound is a regular parallelogram, the long side of which is about 300 yards in length, the shorter, 60 or 70 yards, From the longer side of the base it uses from the North and South with a steep assent to the height of 65 or 70 feet, leaving a level plain on the top of 12 feet in width and 90 in length. The North and South part of this Mound is joined by two regular rises, each in oval forms of half its height, forming three regular rises from the plain. The assent of each elevated part is as suden as the principal Mound at the narrower side of its Base.

From the top of this Mound we beheld a most beautiful landscape; Numerous herds of buffalow were seen feeding in various direction; the Plain to the North N.W. and N.E. extends without interruption as far as can be seen.

Of course the view has been altered considerably due to vanished wildlife, tree belts, power lines, etc.; but if preserved in its present state, Spirit Mound would appear much as Lewis and Clark left it.

Natural erosion, a cattle lot, and the location of a pit silo on the west side have been the only factors altering Spirit Mound's appearance.

In August of 1804, the Lewis and Clark party camped on the Missouri's south bank near the mouth of White Stone Creek. Clark reported that across the river to the north they could see a conical hill and he related its spiritual background:

In a northerley derection from the Mouth of this Creek in an emence Plain a high Hill is situated, and appears of a Conic form, and by the different nations of Indians in this quarter is Suppose to be the residence of Deavels. That they are in human form with remarkable large heads, and about 18 Inches high, that they are very watchful and are arm'd with Sharp arrows with which they Can Kill at a great distance; they are Said to kill all persons who are So hardy as to attempt to approach the hill; they State that tradition informs them that many Indians have Suffered by these little people, and among others three MAHAR Men fell a sacrefise to their murceless fury not many Years Sence. So Much do the Maha [Omaha], Soues [Sioux], Ottoes [Otoes] and other neighboring nations believe this fable, that no Consideration is Suffecient to induce them to approach (DeVoto, 22) the hill.

The following morning, Saturday, August 25, Clark, Captain Lewis, and several of their men walked the nine miles to Spirit Mound. They discovered its inhabitants to be a great number of birds and insects driven to the hill's lee side by the prairie winds. Climbing the summit they surveyed the surrounding country and returned to the river. As to the spirit legend Clark speculated:

One evidence which the Inds give for believeing this place to be the residence of some unusial Spirits is that they frequently discover a large assemblage of Birds about this Mound is in my opinion a Sufficent proof to produce in the Savage Mind a Confident belief of all the properties which they ascribe it. (DeVoto, 24)

No archeologic discoveries have been made on Spirit Mound. Its significance lies in the hill's association with Lewis and Clark. The many

dams along the river have innundated the majority of their campsites and council sites. Spirit Mound is one of the few remaining physical features on the Upper Missouri readily identifiable as a place the explorers visited and recorded.
