

## **SUMMARY**

The Waldo Water Tower is located in Waldo, Columbia County, Arkansas. Situated in southern Arkansas, the small town of Waldo was founded along the Cotton Belt Railroad. The Pittsburgh Des Moines Steel Company began construction on the Waldo Water Tower in 1935 and completed it in 1936. The Public Works Administration Agency (PWA), created as part of President Roosevelt's New Deal in 1933, aided in construction of the tower. Currently, the Waldo Water Tower sits behind the Waldo City Hall.

#### **ELABORATION**

The Waldo Water Tower rises several feet above the community of Waldo, Arkansas. Although it is not the only water source for the community (a second water tower was constructed in the 1940s), it remains in use today. The tank of the tower rests on four steel legs that rise from the ground to the base of the tank. There is a utility ladder which runs down the leg on the south side. Metal Crosspieces are inserted between the legs to provide additional support. There is a water pipe which runs from the ground to the center of the base of the tank, transporting water back and forth from the ground to the tank.

The base of the water tank is shaped like a bowl which is pierced in the center by the water pipe. At the top of the base there is a walkway that encircles the tank. Four sheets of metal comprise the walls of the tank. The north and south walls of the tank are painted with black letters that read "WALDO." The metal roof of the tank is conical shaped. It extends a few feet past the tank and slants upwards towards a single point.

## **INTEGRITY**

The Waldo Water Tower retains its original fabric and setting. It remains in use today.

#### **SUMMARY**

The Waldo Water Tower is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with **local significance** under **Criterion A** for its association with the Public Works Administration. The Waldo Water Tower is also being nominated under **Criterion C** as a unique example of the 1930s water tower construction because it is the only surviving example of a PWA-built water tower in Waldo, Columbia County, Arkansas. The Waldo Water Tower is being submitted under the multiple property-listing "An Ambition to Be Preferred: New Deal Recovery Efforts and Architecture in Arkansas, 1933-1943."

#### **ELABBORATION**

Situated in a heavily wooded area, Columbia County was organized in 1852 by the General Assembly and formed from portions of Lafayette and Ouachita Counties. Unlike so many other counties in the delta that prospered from river transportation, Columbia County's lack of navigable rivers, delayed growth until the mid nineteenth century, when the government opened up river access by blasting.

Despite the county's early seclusion from major rivers such as the Red and Ouachita Rivers, its land, rich in soil, was good for farming. Even before the founding of Columbia County in 1852, large farm plantations prospered in the area as the production of cotton increased. Cotton, the only export of the time, led to growth in areas of the county that would otherwise be neglected.<sup>2</sup> But, the inconvenience of the county's location presented difficulty for farmers. With no other venues of trade, farmers were forced to haul cotton by oxen to Shreveport, Louisiana to be shipped. In 1874, the Iron Mountain Railroad in southern Arkansas passed through Hope, a small town in south central Arkansas, opening up a new trade access for farmers in Columbia County. With this new trade center, farmers from Columbia County were not forced to travel as far on business. Then, in 1881 Columbia County created a back rail from the main St. Louis, Arkansas and Texas Railway line out to Magnolia.<sup>3</sup>

In 1883, the Cotton Belt Railroad was built, permitting railroad rights to the town of Magnolia, the seat of Columbia County. In the same year, the town of Waldo was founded. Prior to the founding of Waldo, Colonel John Dockery, a veteran of the Mexican War, built the first plantation of the area, Lamartine, named after a French poet. In 1839, a small settlement grew around the plantation as trappers and hunters traveled north from Louisiana along the Old Military Road. The settlement encompassed a few plantations and a post office. In 1883, the Cotton Belt Railroad missed the site of Lamartine by three and a half miles. Historians believe that the settlement of Lamartine was relocated to the present site of Waldo.

The Cotton Belt Railroad played a significant role in the founding of Waldo. In 1883, the postmaster of Waldo convinced the Cotton Belt Railroad Company to invest in the new town, and to use it as a regular railroad station. In November of that year, through the Subsidiary Southwestern Improvement Association, the Cotton Belt Railroad Company purchased 26 acres of the new town. The land was then surveyed, and laid off in lots. Records show that at this time there were 96 business lots and 120 residential lots. <sup>6</sup> Mr. Pace, the postmaster, opened the first store and became the first station agent. In 1888 the town of Waldo was incorporated and named after Col. J. Waldo, Vice President of the Texas Division of the Cotton Belt Railroad Company. <sup>7</sup>

The town experienced the greatest population growth at the turn of the century as the population increased from 700 to 1,000.8 During this time Waldo was flourishing as an important mill site. In 1887 there were seven saw mills, one belonging to the Niemeyer Lumber Company. In 1933 there were forty business recorded in the town.

In 1935 the Arkansas State Planning Board met with the Public Works Administration to begin planning for the conservation of the Arkansas natural resources. The PWA accepted the task to improve all of the water sources in the State. <sup>10</sup> In that same year, the construction on the Waldo Water Tower began. The PWA gave a \$43,500 loan and a \$15,987 grant for the project. The Waldo Water Tower was completed May, 1936. <sup>11</sup>

Today the Waldo Water Tower continues to operate as one of the primary water sources for the town of Waldo. It serves as a reminder of the PWA construction and work during the 1930s.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Waldo Water Tower is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion A for its association with the Public Works Administration. The Waldo Water Tower is also being nominated under Criterion C as a unique example of the 1930s water tower construction because it is the only surviving example of a PWA-built water tower in Waldo, Columbia County, Arkansas. The Waldo Water Tower is being submitted under the multiple property-listing "An Ambition to Be Preferred: New Deal Recovery Efforts and Architecture in Arkansas, 1933-1943."






