Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The North Mankato Public School was originally constructed in 1890 as a simple Queen Anne two story, four room brick and stone structure two and one half stories in height. It was set upon a high basement of coursed rusticated ashlar, a material which was employed as decorative treatment for window sills and lintels, gable copings, and the arched entrance. Entry was gained through an off-set square tower which was crowned by an open belfry and pyramidal room, and which was integrated at the upper level into the slope of the truncated hip roof.

In 1904 the original structure was doubled in size with an addition identical in architectural detailing and proportions to the original. The tower was retained and as such assumed a prominent central position in the principal facade of the building. This facade became symmetrical as a result, conveying a unified appearance of the two sections as a single building.

The school complex also includes a two story brick addition to the north (rear), completed in 1920.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The North Mankato Public School is significant as the most locally distinctive public building in the city and as a good representative example of a local adaptation of a Queen Anne style school building.

North Mankato, platted in 1857, developed slowly. Its location between St. Peter, Nicollet County's county seat, and Mankato, Blue Earth County's county seat, its geographical isolation on the west bank of the Minnesota River, and its lack of rail service hampered sustained development.

However, by 1880 a bridge spanning the Minnesota River connected Mankato and North Mankato, and a period of marked growth began in the city. A lower tax base in North Mankato attracted home owners who commuted to work in Mankato. A substantial brick industry added further economic impetus to the city. These boom years in industry and population resulted in the need for a new public school and in 1890 a two-story four room school was constructed in the heart of the downtown area at a cost of \$4,000. Increased enrollment by 1904 necessitated the construction of an addition to the east end of the school. George Pass of Mankato and O.M. Hagwell of North Mankato were selected as architect and contractor respectively. (Although records do not exist, it is probable that Pass designed the original school building as well, since the 1904 addition is virtually identical to the original in form and use of materials.) The 1904 addition. which cost \$5.380, doubled the number of classrooms. By 1920, the population had doubled and a seven room addition was constructed on the north side of the building. With this final addition, the school operated until 1959 when it was sold for office and commercial space. Current plans call for the total restoration and rehabilitation of the building for use as rental apartments.

The prominent location of the North Mankato Public School in the heart of the city's central business district makes it an important representative of the growth and development of North Mankato and a focal point of the community which served its educational needs for 70 years.
