DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The LeJeune House once controlled a plantation with out-buildings along False River. But the growth of the town of New Roads has engulfed all but the present two acre lot. The house has been separated from the river by East Main Street, but because it is set back over 200 feet from the road among magnolia and live oak trees, it still retains a naturalistic setting.

The house itself is a two story, pitch roof, raised cottage with broad frontal galleries. The plan consists of four rooms arranged in a line with secondary rooms to the rear. At one time, the plan probably consisted of two rooms on each floor with galleries on all four sides. Apparently, major remodeling took place some time during the first half of the 19th century. 'At'that time, the second floor side and rear galleries were enclosed, and side rooms, cabinets and rear hall were created. The present pitched roof was probably built at that time as well.

The next major remodeling was done in the early 20th century. It was then that the lower side and rear galleries were bricked in and converted to utility rooms. The rear staircase was installed, and a pair of dormers were replaced by a large single shed dormer. Much of the structure is "brick entre poteaux" with heavy hewn cypress framing members. The beams in the downstairs kitchen and dining room are beaded and exposed. The floors under the enclosed upstairs galleries slope towards the outside, indicating that at one time these areas were open and exposed to the weather. The present upstairs wooden gallery dates from about the mid-19th century. The wooden gallery downstairs rotted in the early 20th century, and the cypress columns were replaced with heavy splayed brick and concrete columns. The old shingles on the roof have been replaced by tin.

The upstairs gallery has eight square columns with heavy molded capitols. Most of the interior decorative work dates from the Greek Revival period. The mantles are of the "wraparound" type. All have full entablatures resting upon pilasters with molded capitols. The four upstairs fireplaces are particularly fine with aedicula motifs framing the overmantle areas. The east parlor has unusually fine paneling with molded capitol pilasters and a full entablature. The ceiling is divided into molded panels in a manner that suggests coffering. The four front rooms communicate with the gallery by means of five partially paneled French doors. Most of the doorways on the second floor are surmounted by transoms with the panes decoratively disposed.

The boundaries of the nominated area were chosen to encompass all that remains intact of the original land holding.

Despite the 20th century modifications, the significant features, i.e. the form of the building, the plan, the second floor gallery and the major rooms, remain intact.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The LeJeune House is one of a number of substantial plantation houses which were The house, built along False River. therefore, is significant on the parish level. It is the finest and the largest historic residence in the town of New Roads. In addition, LeJeune House is an excellent example of an early to mid-19th century plantation house. This can be seen in its raised cottage form, its size, its plan, and its fine Greek Revival details. The paneling in the east parlor, with its pilasters and coffering effect, is particularly unusual and elaborate. Finally, the house is significant as a substantial example of "brick entre poteaux" construction.

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
