<u>Confederate Memorial</u> Jessamine County, Kentucky

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**Description** The Confederate Memorial on the courthouse lawn in Nicholasville consists of two parts: the statue and the base. The statue is a seven foot tall bronze figure of a Confederate soldier at rest, but watchful. He is holding his rifle near the bayonet with both hands. He is wearing a kepi hat and a nap sack. The pedestal is about eleven feet tall and is made of unpolished granite. It is inscribed on all four sides. The inscriptions read from the front clockwise: "Our Confederate Dead Who they were few may know What they were all know 1861-1865;" "Nor braver bled for brighter land nor brighter land had a cause so grand;" "On fame's eternal camping ground their silent tents are spread and glory guards with solemn round the bivouac of the dead;" "The muffled drums sad roll has beat the soldier's last tattoo no more on life's parade shall meet the brave and daring few."

Statement of Significance The Confederate Memorial on the courthouse lawn in Nicholasville meets National Register criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky., 1861-1935." This monument was the result of 16 years of fund raising in Jessamine County. Jefferson Oxley a former Confederate soldier and citizen of Jessamine County began fund raising to erect a suitable monument in 1880. He formed the Jessamine County Memorial Association and the effort moved slowly forward. By the mid 1890s the association still had not raised enough funds for a memorial. However, they were alerted to an unclaimed statue that a monument company would sell at a discount. The statue originally designed as a Union soldier was altered to become a Confederate and for some \$1,500 a memorial was erected in Nicholasville. This monument was unveiled in 1896 in front of some 3,500 people on the courthouse lawn by Lawson Oxley, the son of Jefferson Oxley, who died just prior to the event. A special train from Louisville brought another 160 including keynote speaker Bennett Young, who over the course of his life would dedicate numerous Confederate monuments in Kentucky. This monument is an excellent example of the property type "statue."

**Verbal Boundary Description** - The Confederate Memorial whose boundaries form a circle with a radius of ten feet located on the courthouse lawn in Nicholasville.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
