SUMMARY

Impressive as an early Arkansas example of the Georgian Revival, the West House was built in Helena in 1900. The house is a meticulously detailed blend of the Georgian Revival with Queen Anne decorative details. Built by the Clem Brothers of St. Louis for Mercer Elmer West, the house is identical in plan to the Short-Bieri House, also in Helena, constructed by the same builder.

ELABORATION

The West House was built in 1900 by the Clem Brothers of St. Louis for Mercer Elmer West and his wife, Mary Moore Govan West. Highly respected builders, the Clem Brothers are known to have constructed three houses in Helena. The West House sits high on a terrace of Crowley's Ridge and commands a magnificient view of Helena and the Mississippi River.

The West House is a two-and-a-half story frame structure of Georgian Revival design, with some features such as cornice brackets and stained glass used in some of the windows reflecting the influence of the Queen Anne style, which in 1900 was coming to an end. The symmetrical placement of windows and doors, the Greek Ionic columns of the wide verandah and the use of Palladian windows on each floor clearly demonstrate the predominate influence of the Georgian Revival. The house sits on a brick foundation and has four brick chimneys, one of which has decorative corbeling. The wide full front varandah of the front facade curves outward to form a rounded projection at the south corner. Verandah detailing includes Ionic columns, a rail of turned spindles, and a dentilled cornice. The centered front door is flanked by sidelights and has a transom above. Slender columns between the door and sidelights support an architrave with an applique of garland swags. A bay window to the left of the entrance has a fixed center with a stained glass transom, flanked by double-hung windows. A Palladian window to the right of the entrance adds further interest to the front facade. Centered above the entrance is a slightly projecting bay with a Palladian window, equal in width to the entrance, with pilasters supporting a keystoned cornice. A wide bracketed cornice details the projecting bay. Bay windows with three one-over-one double-hung windows flank the center fenestration. The slate covered roof is punctured by two gable roofed dormers, each with slate siding and a dentilled cornice. The center window is oversized with a pair of arched casement windows. The flanking pedimented dormers have a single double-hung window, with diamond-paned upper sash. The north elevation has three windows on each floor and a single dormer. An interior brick chimney punctures the hipped roof. A three-sided bay window with three double-hung windows is positioned at the east corner of the first floor. The south side elevation has similarly arranged fenestrations, the largest consisting of a single fixed pane topped by a stained glass transom and balanced on either side by a

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double-hung window. A one story gable roofed kitchen with side porch extends from the rear. A second floor sleeping porch is partially enclosed and a single dormer penetrates the roof. The north portion of the rear elevation is covered by a cross gable roof.

The interior is finished in white oak. Doors are made of quarter-sawn oak. The parlor, library and dining room are separated by pocket doors, while others throughout the house are paneled with transoms. The central hall is highlighted by an elaborately carved stairway with a built-in curved settee beneath the landing. The stairs, with wood paneled wall below, have square newel posts with bead trim and an applique of ribboned laurels. Each newel post is topped by a carved wood urn. Three steps lead to a landing, turn and continue in a straight flight. Resting atop one of the newel posts is an Ionic column supporting a frieze of spindles that spans the width of the hall. The library is located to the right of the entrance and the parlor to the left. The dining room is located off the parlor. Three elaborately carved corner fireplaces on the first floor have tile faces and classically detailed mantelpieces with inset beveled mirrors. The library mantel is distinctive for the two large Neptune figures that flank either side. All rooms have a picture mould and three-quarter round corner mouldings. Simple architrave mouldings and cornices surround the doors.

Though none remain today, there originally was a carriage house, horse barn, cow shed and other outbuildings behind the house. Except for attaching the kitchen in 1960, there have been no changes to the original structure of the house.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Constructed in 1900 for Mercer Elmer West, the West House on Beech Street in Helena is a marvelous example of the Georgian Revival style. Some Queen Anne decorative detailing ties the house to others on the block which precede it by a few years. The house was built by the Clem Brothers of St. Louis who came to Helena to build several of the finer homes in town. One of these, the Short-Bieri House (NR-74), is a mirror image of the West House. The two houses are located only a block away from each other, and they are often referred to as the "sister houses." The West House exhibits some of the finest craftsman-ship available during the period. West was involved in the timber business, as well as being a prominent banker, and hand-picked all of the white oak which was used throughout the house. The elaborately carved mantels, parquet floors, pocket doors, and panelling were produced from trees cut from those growing on Crowley's Ridge upon which most of Helena sits. These trees were then milled and cured at the McCoy lumber yard in Helena. All of this attention to detail produced a house which is considered by Helenians and others as nothing less than impressive.
