As center of county government, an Iowa town was reasonably assured of economic and population growth, and a prominent role in local social and political life. The county courthouse represents a significant public investment in a structure built not simply for utilitarian purposes, but also as a monument associated with the historical importance of county organization and development. TAMA COUNTY

Tama County built its first courthouse at Toledo in 1854 for a cost of \$1,300. It was a frame structure, two stories high, and was used until it was outgrown in 1866. In 1865, a Courthouse Association was organized to decide what to do about a new courthouse. Appropriately, the intent to build a courthouse was advertised, and bids were requested from interested contractors. P. B. McCullough of Toledo submitted the lowest bid and won the contract. In modern times we often find parties bidding artificially low in order to secure a government contract. In general, the government agency of today ends up as the loser because it has to raise additional monies in order to complete its project. However, in the Iowa of more than 100 years turned over to H. B. Belden. The final cost of the building was over \$22,000, but the county paid only \$5,000.

The building still stands in the public square at Toledo and looks not very different from the year in which it was completed, 1866. The building was constructed to cover an area of 45 by 72 feet. The foundation is stone and the walls are made of brick with a roof fashioned, well over 100 years ago, from corrugated iron. The belfry was constructed so that it can be reached from a second story stairway.
