

Significance According to local tradition Tocaland was named after the Tokay grape which was grown on the plantation．Julian Bolick＇s A Fairfield County Sketchbook indicates that Regina Gadsden the original owner，was the wife of Christopher Gadsden，Jr．of Charleston． He was a noted horticulturist and landscape gardener who established nurseries and planted boxwoods and gardens on the property． 1 Tocaland is a very intact example of an antebellum residence set on a raised basement，with Greek Revival elements such as the well－defined Order－－including pilasters，entablature，pediment，and proportions．These classical elements would support the local tradition that the house was constructed ca． 1854.
