7. Description

The Halltown Memorial Chapel, formerly the Halltown Union Colored Sunday School, sits on a small (100' by 75') lot on the old Smithfield-Charles Town-Harpers Ferry Turnpike, at Halltown, Jefferson County, West Virginia. Its setting is just as it was when the chapel was constructed in 1901 and the building itself is in near-original appearance and condition, due to a thorough restoration undertaken in 1982-83.

The chapel itself is a small one-story structure 50 feet long and 40 feet wide. An excellent vernacular example of Gothic Revival Style architecture, the chapel is of rubble stone construction with eight engaged buttresses (four on each side wall) that reinforce the walls of the chapel to the height of the window sills. The pointed arched windows and door are prominent elements in its design. The roof is steeply pitched in the Gothic manner and is sheathed with wooden shacks. The entrance stoop is of stone with solid stone rails and is sheltered with a gabled stick-style roof which carries a short shingle covered belfry. This belfry is another of the prominent features that distinguish the chapel.

The opened beamed gable roof of the sanctuary is designed in the same manner as the open beamed roof of the gabled entrance porch. A tripartide arrangement of lancet stained glass windows in the center of the sanctuary rear wall is a very distinguishing feature, as is the memorial stained glass overlight over the door. The interior wall finish is a white painted plaster surface. The original raised dias and pulpit are intact.

The Halltown Memorial Chapel is a landmark of unique character and design to Jefferson County, West Virginia.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Halltown Union Colored Sunday School, located at Halltown in Jefferson County, West Virginia, is significant as a fine example of vernacular stone construction. In the building's greatest area of significance is, however, its unique relationship to the community of Black Americans in Jefferson County and the importance it has played in the social and religious life of that community. 2

Explanatory Notes

- 1. The Halltown Memorial Chapel, to use its present designation, is a unique example of stone religious architecture in Jefferson County, West Virginia. While stone is a common building material in this region, the chapel is a small (40' by 50') structure of the Gothic Revival, that is cathedral-like in appearance and which has a commanding, almost stately presence. There is certainly no other edifice in the county that has the same architectural feeling, and it is, it is believed, unique in design in the state of West Virginia.
- 2. The Halltown Union Colored Sunday School was constructed in 1901 in response to a need in the Black Community in Jefferson County for a place of worship. At the urging of leaders of the local Black Community, Daniel B. Lucas, former state supreme court justice, detached a parcel of land from his "Rion Hall" estate (listed in the National Register, September 20, 1982) for the purpose of erecting a Sunday School building adjacent to the old "colored free school." Artisans and workers from the Black community labored after working hours and on days off to erect on the Old Smithfield-Charles Town-Harpers Ferry Turnpike, the splendid little stone chapel that became the Halltown Union Colored Sunday School, which was open to all denominations. Among the original trustees of the Sunday School were T.C. Green, George S. Euster, Frank Nichols, Morton Shelton, Roy Allison, and William White.

For over sixty years the Halltown Union Colored Sunday School served the Jefferson County Black community as a focal point in their lives. Not only church services, but marriages, funerals, and many social and community events were held at the little stone chapel. The Sunday School closed in 1967, though the chapel continued to be used for occasional weddings and funerals. In 1982, however, the community formed the Halltown Memorial Chapel Association and, during 1982-83, have completely restored the building to excellent condition. Thus, the future of this building, which has such high significance to the Black community, seems assured.
