## DESCRIPTION:

Slieter's Market is a two-story, rectangular commercial building constructed of locally quarried quartzite stone, on the front facade, and rough stone on the sides. The building sits on a single commercial lot in the middle of a block. On the first floor facade, single round-arched windows flank an arched doorway. The second floor facade has three evenly spaced arched windows. Facade detailing includes raised belt coursing below the second floor windows, a corbeled cornice, and bracketed finials at the corners of the roof line.

## SIGNIFICANCE:

Slieter's Market is one of the earliest and least altered quartzite buildings on Jasper's main street. Many of the stone buildings date from after the turn of the century, and most have lost much of their original integrity.

The site of the present market has long had a meat market. One of Jasper's earliest buildings was a frame meat market built on the site in 1888. This stone structure replaced the frame building in 1894.

Quartzite is central to Jasper's history. Both the town's prosperity and name come from the nearby quarry. The townsite was platted by the Jasper Improvement Company and then sold to the Sioux Valley Stone Company. Most of the commercial structures are built of local stone, similar to Pipestone's business district. The ravages of facade alterations have damaged the streetscape. Slieter's gremains as the building retaining its original integrity.
