Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Saum Schools are situated on a wooded four-acre tract of land one half mile west of Saum; they are accessible from Range Line Road #23. Both buildings are owned by the Beltrami County Historical Society which maintains them with the aid of the Saum Community Club.

The Log School is the oldest of the two buildings. It was constructed in 1903. It is a simple gabled structure with a single door on one gable end, solid wall on the other gable end, and three windows on each side. Corners are joined by saddle-notching on the interior, the school consists of one room. Walls are not plastered and show the round log-and-chinking construction. The Log School was originally built on the west side of Range Line Road #23. It was moved to the east side of the road to a location immediately north of the Consolidated School building and restored in 1958. Restoration was made possible with funds from the County Centennial Committee; the building was then given to the Beltrami County Historical Society. Care has been taken to restore both the exterior and interior to an accurate representation of the original appearance. Among the period furnishings within the school building are teacher's and students' desks, books, maps, a hanging globe, wall-hung reflector-type kerosene lamps, and a wood-burning stove from the Battle River School (a building of the same vintage).

The Consolidated School is a two story frame building erected in 1912. It is essentially rectangular in plan with a slight projection on the principal facade to allow for an entrance vestibule and cloak rooms. The building is virtually devoid of decorative architectural treatments. Exceptions are a centrally positioned fanlighted dormer which projects from the hipped roof and a basket-weave design band in the frieze above the double entry doors. The interior is essentially unaltered with the exception of converting the library into a kitchen to provide services for community events. One of the class rooms has been retained in the appearance as it existed at the time the school closed in 1960. The remainder of the building serves as a community center.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Saum Schools present an excellent picture of the evolution and development of educational facilities in northern Minnesota during the first two decades of the twentieth century. Further, the second building to be erected on this site pioneered in becoming the first consolidated school to be constructed for that purpose in Minnesota.

The Log School, erected in 1903, is representative of the manner in which early settlers met the needs for educational facilities. Comprised of one room and a limited number of furnishings, this building served the children of the immediate vicinity around the Saum community. It continued to function as a school until 1912 after which it became a teacher's residence. In 1958 it was restored for use as a museum.

The Consolidated School, erected in 1912, marked the first attempt in Minnesota to combine the educational needs of three communities into one facility. Each of these communities (Foy, Battle River, and Saum) had previously been served by oneroom log buildings. Although these three communities were populated mostly by persons who had been in the United States no more than ten years, they had considered improving educational services even prior to the establishment of the Consolidation Act of 1911. When the Act became law, they were the first in Minnesota to apply for funds for the construction of a new building.
