DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The United Methodist Church in Jasper, Florida was constructed in 1878 and has undergone several alterations. The original structure appears to have been a small, rectangular frame building resting on piers, with a belltower centered on the entrance facade. Later expansion consisted of the addition of the transepts and sanctuary creating the irregular Latin Cross plan of the church today. Subsequent additions did not alter the main body of the church, but expanded to the northeast corner of the building.

The exterior of the building is dominated by a belltower with two setbacks and a steeple. The exterior fabric of the structure is wood, drop siding painted white. The nave of the church, along with the belltower appears to be the original 1878 building, and is decorated with corner pilasters and a plain frieze. This detailing is also evident in the base of the belltower, which forms the small front vestibule, and in the tower itself. The decorative treatment of the transcepts and sanctuary is simpler consisting of corner boards and no frieze. The nave and transepts of the church are surmounted by gable roofs covered with diamond pattern composition shingles; while the roof of the sanctuary is hipped. The belltower setbacks are covered by pent roofs of the same material. The main entrance is centered on the west (front) facade and has panelled double doors. Small, gable porches protect both the front and side entrances. This secondary entrance is located on the west side of the north transept. The entire structure rests on a continuous concrete block foundation added in 1943, along with the addition of the entrance porches. Also of interest is the regular placement of stained glass, lancet windows with lable mouldings. Of the 17 windows installed in 1905, only 15 remain. Two windows were apparently located on the northeast corner of the sanctuary where the rectangular addition is connected. With the exception of the paired lancets on the north and south sides of the nave, the remaining windows are single.

The most interesting feature of the interior is the tongue-and-groove, wood cove ceiling of the nave. Since this treatment is repeated in both transepts and in the sanctuary, it is difficult to establish whether this was an original element or a later addition. The walls of the nave and transepts are plastered and painted off-white, and have a beaded tongue-and-groove wainscot. All interior decorations, except the ceiling which is painted off-white, appear to be wood tone. These include the chancel rail, corner pilasters, window and door architraves, and wainscot. The sanctuary was entirely remodelled in 1938 and included the addition of a new altar; 3 square, stained glass, altar windows; and walnut stained panelling and wainscot. The floor and pews appear to be of a lighter wood finish than the other wood tone decorations.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

There are very few written records that can clarify the early history of the United Methodist Church in Jasper. The significance of the building can be derived from the fact that it is almost 100 years old and is one of three remaining active Methodist Churches in Hamilton County.

The first Methodist Circuit Rider came to Hamilton County in 1825, but it wasn't until 1847-8 that the Methodist Congregation in Jasper decided that a building was necessary for their Church Services. Oral tradition indicates that a small, log structure was erected at the northwest corner of a lot which is today the oldest part of the city cemetery. The building was apparently destroyed by a hurricane on September 15, 1858. After that disaster, no new structure was constructed by the Methodist Church probably due to the hard times brought on by the Civil War and its aftermath.

In 1878, Dr. Lucian Frink and Mrs. Martha E. Frink donated a lot for the construction of the present building, begun in September of that year. 2 It is not clear why a new lot was necessary instead of rebuilding on the site of their previous building. No photographic or written information is available on the configuration of the Church, but oral tradition indicates that it was a small, rectangular, frame building with a belltower centered on the entrance facade. In 1904-5, \$1500 were raised for repairs to the church under the pastorate of Reverend S. W. Lawler, Sr.³ It is probable that these "repairs" consisted of the expansion of the building by the addition of the north and south transepts and the sanctuary. The stained glass windows are also believed to have been added during this time. In 1932-3, a small country church was moved to Jasper and attached to the northeast corner of the building. 4 This section was expanded in 1947. Since 1938, several additional interior remodellings were undertaken completing the building as it is today.



The United Methodist Church in Jasper is architecturally significant due to the fact that the building is almost 100 years old. This makes it one of the oldest surviving structures in Hamilton County. Although heavily altered through later additions and remodellings, the nave and belltower appear to be the original structure erected in September, 1878. Oral tradition indicates that the Church was a small, rectangular, frame building with a belltower centered on the entrance facade. The present exterior configuration of the Church has been the same since 1904-5, when \$1,500 were raised for repairs to the church under the pastorate of Reverend S. W. Lawler, Sr. 1 It is probable that these "repairs" consisted of the expansion of the building by the addition of the north and south transepts and the sanctuary. The stained glass windows are also believed to have been added during this time.


