The Bybee-Howell house on Sauvie Island, built in 1856, is one of the finest examples of the 19th century Classic Revival in Oregon, if not the West Coast. Carefully restored, it is a two-story frame structure of rectangular plan with a one-story kitchen ell. The facade is formally arranged with a center door flanked by two windows on either side. The same arrangement is repeated on both floors. The ground floor door, which has sidelights and transom, opens onto a small portico supported by two square tapered wooden columns. The roof of the portico, which is surrounded by a ballustrade, serves as a balcony or deck for the upper door, The gable ends of the house are fully pedimented. Slender pilasters of the colossal order trim the corners, and a plain freize with trim molding and a molded cornice surrounds the main block. Openings are surrounded by a simple architrave with a molded cornice. Two chimneys are symmetrically placed on the longitudinal axis set in from the gable ends. The exterior has lap siding with double-hung windows containing six lights over six. Decorative moldings are built-up using laminated strips of lumber.

The Bybee-Howell house was one of the first houses in Oregon to be plastered inside, and the house as a whole was lavishly finished. The hall is of oak, the library of California redwood, and the dining room of ash with built-in cupboards. The floor and wood-work in the parlor is white maple. There are seven fireplaces, each with slightly different Classic Revival detail. The house's nine rooms are formally arranged around a central stairway hall. Acquired by the Oregon Historical Society in 1961 in a very poor state of repair, the house was fully restored after researching techniques and materials of the time in territorial Oregon. It is furnished with contemporary pieces, some of them Oregon-made.

The Bybee-Howell house is an unusually lavish and rare example of the Classic Revival style of the mid-nineteenth century in the Pacific Northwest. James Bybee and his wife Julia came to Oregon with their small children from Kentucky in 1847 and settled on Sauvie Island in the Columbia River near Portland. With the discovery of gold in California, Bybee headed south, where, according to a contemporary source, "he made a fortune." Returning in 1854, he claimed 642,21 acres on Sauvie's Island under the Donation Land Law of 1850, and was appointed one of the first three Multnomah County Commissioners. A lover of thoroughbred hourses, by the time he started his house in 1856, he had nearly completed a large race track on another portion of the property.

In 1858, shortly after its completion, the house was sold to the owners of an adjoining Donation Land Claim, Dr. Benjamin and Elizabeth Howell. Two of the Howell sons gained prominence as Northwest botanists (in 1903 Thomas published a text and reference book, <u>Flora of Northwest America</u>) and a third son became a distinguished Oregon farmer. The house remained in the Howell family until 1961, when it was purchased along with seventyfive acres for use as a park and game refuge by Multnomah County.
