#### **Narrative Description**

The Plymouth Post Office is a one-story, tan brick building with limestone trim located in a combined residential and commercial district in Plymouth, Wisconsin. The building has a flat roof and sits on a brick-faced, raised basement. The building's architecture is minimalist, of a style sometimes called "WPA Moderne."

The front elevation is organized symmetrically around the entry doors. The doors, transom panel above, and two large windows are recessed deeply into the face, highlighting the entrance. These recesses are trimmed with both smooth and fluted limestone. The building retains its original windows. The wide entry stairs are granite and have painted metal railings at the center and sides.

The two other windows of the front elevation, one near each of the two corners, are six over nine light double hung. The windows have narrow side panes on either side of a larger center light. There is a limestone course around the building at the window sill level and one at the level of the top of the limestone panels around the front entry.

The side elevations employ large and small windows. The west elevation has four small and one large window. The east elevation has three large and one small window. At the rear of the building is a one-story loading dock, which creates the stem of a "T" in the building's plan. The loading dock was extended in the late 1970s or early 1980s.

A cornerstone is located at the front left of the building. It reads: "James A. Farley, Postmaster General, John M. Carmody, Federal Works Administrator, W. Englebert Reynolds, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Louis A. Simon, Supervising Architect, Neal A. Melick, Supervising Engineer, 1940."

The interior lobby retains its original terrazzo floor and marble wainscot. The walls and ceiling are of plaster. The wood, trim, doors, and vestibule are original. A glass partition has been added to separate lobby functions and the lighting fixtures are modern.

Over the door to the Postmaster's office is a large mural painted by Charles Thwaites. Titled "Making Cheese" the mural is dated 22 November 1941. The scene is painted in dark greens, browns, and muted whites and yellows. It depicts a group of men engaged in the various steps of making cheese. The story of the process begins at the right of the mural where milk delivered by the farmer is being weighed and the empty cans set aside. In the center, the milk is processed in one of the huge vats by stirring machinery, rennet and coloring solution is added and the temperature is noted. At the left, a worker tests the acid content, while at the back, cheese is removed from the molds and stored in the refrigerator room. Through the window is a view of a Wisconsin farm with Holstein cattle.

The post office building and the mural retain a high level of integrity.

#### **Narrative Statement of Significance**

The Plymouth Post Office is an intact example of the a Federal post office in the context of the multiple property nomination "United States Post Office Construction form 1913 to 1943, State of Wisconsin – Milwaukee District." The building is nominated under Criterion C- Art for the Public Works mural "Cheese Making" by Charles Thwaites in its lobby.

#### **Historic Context**

The Plymouth Post Office is the first federally owned post office building in Plymouth. Prior to its construction, postal services were conducted is various locations selected by the local postmaster. Postal service in Plymouth dates from 1846 and the first postmaster was Thomas I. Davidson.<sup>1</sup>

This post office was one of several constructed in Wisconsin by the federal Public Works Administration in the 1930s and early 1940s. The history of post office construction in Wisconsin in this era is detailed in the multiple property nomination. The historic context for public art in the post offices of this period is also featured in the multiple property nomination.

Plans for the post office building were underway by 1938. The newspaper reported \$85,000 had been slated for the building and the site. The cost of the site could not exceed 20% of the money allocated.<sup>2</sup> Bids from contractors were received by the Spring of 1940. Ring Construction Corporation of Maryland and Minneapolis, Minnesota won the contract and completed the building in 1941.

#### Significance

The Plymouth Post Office is considered eligible for listing in the NRHP by meeting the registration requirements for federally owned post offices as specified in the multiple property nomination for post office construction in Wisconsin between 1913 and 1943. The Plymouth Post Office is eligible for the mural found in its lobby.

The mural, "Cheese Making," by Chares Thwaites is a good example of Depression-era art executed under the auspices of the Public Works Administration (PWA) and the Works Projects Administration (WPA). Thwaites also painted murals in the post offices in Greenville, Michigan; Windom, Minnesota; and Chilton, Wisconsin.<sup>3</sup> "Making Cheese" is one of the later murals painted under the federal programs.

The subject of the mural is tied to its locality. Plymouth, Wisconsin is known locally as the cheese center of the world. Thwaites painted the process of making Cheddar cheese, a local specialty. The mural presents a view of a rural cheese factory in the dairy region. In her book on post office murals, Karal Ann Marling

notes that this is one of the few murals in which the artist depicted workers happy in their tasks, rather than the intent demeanor typical in most commissions.<sup>4</sup>

Charles Winstanley Thwaites was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on 12 March 1904. After studying at the University of Wisconsin, he attended the Layton School of Art in Milwaukee. From 1936 to 1939 Thwaites created numerous works for the WPA Art Program. These works were allocated to schools and public buildings throughout Wisconsin. His work has been shown at the Corcoran Gallery of Art in Washington, DC, the American Art Show at Rockefeller Center in New York, and at The Pennsylvania Water Color Show. Charles Thwaites received numerous prizes and awards for his works, including the \$100 prize and medal in the 1939 Wisconsin Painters and Sculptors Show.<sup>5</sup> His submission for the Chilton, Wisconsin, Post Office, "Threshing Barley,' was a winning design in the Forty-Eight States Competition held in 1939. Thwaites died in 1959.

In conclusion, Charles Thwaites' mural "Making Cheese" is locally significant as a good example of federally funded art in America's post offices. The Plymouth Post Office has had only minor alterations and retains a high degree of integrity. The building and its lobby provide an appropriate setting for the mural.
