Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Lt. Hathorn House of Woolwich, Maine is a sturdy and well-preserved example of Late Colonial or post-Colonial style rural domestic architecture. Dating from 1784, the house is of post-and-beam construction with a massive central brick chimney, gable roof, clapboard siding, and field-stone foundation. The house is $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories tall.

The facade, which faces south, is five bays wide with a central entrance. The entrance has a classically simple enframement, consisting of an entablatured lintel supported by Ionic pilasters. The single door is panelled.

Fenestration throughout the building is 9/6 throughout. The ends of the building are two bays wide.

Internally the house is unaltered, with several fully wainscotted rooms and five fireplaces.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Lt. Hathorn House is probably the best preserved example of an early Federal farmhouse in Maine's central coastal region. It remains virtually unchanged both externally and internally except for modern plumbing. The large central chimney with its five fire places is intact and fenestration throughout the house in unchanged. The seven foot kitchen fireplace retains its beehive oven and original hearth. Panelling of unusual detail remains in all the principal rooms. Built by Lt. Richard Hathorn, Revolutionary War veteran, the house has been continuously occupied since its construction.



Dear Ms. Abernathy:

The Maine Historic Preservation Commission nominated the Lt. Hathorn House to the National Register of Historic Places in 1979. It was listed on 2/26/1980. The form as submitted by our office provided Lt. Hathorn House as the historic name of the property. The only given name in the document occurs in the statement of significance where Lt. Richard Hathorn is named as the builder of the house. To conform to naming conventions, the property was listed in the National Register as the Hathorn, Lt. Richard House. The given name of the individual associated with this property is John. Richard is incorrect and should be replaced.

There is no reference to Richard Hathorn in MHPC files for this property or in local histories such as the 1994 *History of Woolwich, Maine: A Town Remembered* by Burnette Bailey Wallace and Frances Soule Maher. Based on current research, there was no Richard Hathorn associated with this property, the Hathorn family or in the area historically. I can find no reason why the given name Richard was included in the original documentation.

All research indicates Lt. John Hathorn was the builder and original owner of the house. The property has historically been called and should be listed as the Hathorn, Lt. John House. The Commission and the homeowner, who brought this to our attention, request that the National Register staff please consider this letter as additional documentation and correct the historic name of the property.
