Description:

The Newport National Bank is five bays wide, three irregular bays deep, 2% stories in height with a gable roof. It is located on the southeast corner of East Market and Marshall streets; the principal facade faces north, toward East Market Street. The building is set back a short distance from the sidewalk, behind a small lawn.

The building was constructed in two principal stages: the five-bay rectangular main block was built in 1864 to house the Newport National Bank and provide living quarters for its cashier. A lower, two-story service ell was included in the original construction, projecting from the eastern portion of the south elevation. In 1927, the building experienced a campaign of renovation and expansion in which the banking space was reconfigured, the lower portion of the north facade was refaced, and the rear ell was broadened and extended to create four rental apartments.

The building is constructed of brick laid in running bond. A typical brick from the original period measures 8½" long, 4" wide, and 2" high; mortar joints average ½" wide. The ground-floor facade, installed in the 1927 remodeling, comprises pressed bricks measuring 8" long, 3-5/8" wide, and 21/4" high, laid with fine " joints. The building rests on a brick foundation.

As originally built, the north facade was five bays wide; it retains this configuration on the second story. The 1927 remodeling resulted in a symmetrical three-bay composition on the ground floor, with a short flight of stone steps leading to a central entrance comprising double-leaf glazed doors surmounted by a transom, set within a Classical surround with flanking pilasters supporting a plain frieze and shallow pediment. The flanking bays are defined by large, nearly square openings with stone sills, holding a tripartite composition of one-over-one sash above paneled spandrels. Pintels survive at the edges of these openings, indicating the attachment of security grilles. A narrow belt course marks the transition to the upper story, whose five bays hold two-over-two sash with plain wooden lintels and sills. A bold bracketed cornice caps the facade and returns at the corners. A pair of arch-headed dormers with two-over-two sash are located on the north slope of the metal-clad roof.

Both gable end elevations of the main block are three irregular bays wide, with two-over-two sash on the first and second stories. The brickwork shows some alteration of the original fenestration pattern on the ground floor of the east end and second story of the west, probably associated with the 1927 renovations.

A pair of chimneys linked by a parapet rises from each gable peak, above a double two-over-two window lighting the attic. The roofline is decorated with a molded rakeboard.

A lower, two-story wing spans the full width of main block on the south, and extends a distance of four bays. This section, added in 1927, comprises four apartments. Physical evidence indicates that it incorporates an original service ell which protruded from the east section of the south elevation. The north gable end of this wing is spanned by a two-story covered porch, with brick columns and a simple balustrade. The side elevations of the wing are capped with a boxed cornice whose design reflects a simplified version of the original cornice on the main block.

The property retains sections of Victorian period iron fencing. Also on the property, located southeast of the main building, is a four-bay garage of brick and frame construction on a concrete block foundation, which does not contribute to the significance of the resource.

Statement of Significance:

The Newport National Bank is significant for its association with the 19thearly 20th century commercial development of Newport, and for its architecture, as an example of a type of commercial building which characterized smaller towns during the period.

The Newport National Bank was chartered March 25, 1865. It absorbed the Real Estate Bank of Newport, which had been established in 1859, and had been headquartered at 7-9 East Market Street (see N-468). A new building had been constructed at the southeast corner of Market and Marshall streets during the previous year for the purpose of housing the newly-organized bank.

A photograph taken prior to the 1927 alterations shows that, as originally constructed, the principal facade of the 2½ story brick combined commercial/residential building was five bays wide, with entrances located in the central and westernmost bays on the ground story, and two-over-two windows in the remaining bays. The bank was located in the western section of the building, with separate entrance and specific functional rooms. commercial/residential functions reflected bank rules which required that the cashier and family reside in the building as a security measure.

Although it served a locally prominent commercial function, the bank building is essentially residential in form, scale, and detailing. Commercial buildings in cities and towns from the 18th through the early 19th century were often essentially indistinguishable from their residential counterparts. By the second quarter of the 19th century, specifically commercial building types began to emerge in larger cities, generally characterized by large display windows framed by masonry piers and lintels. A series of technological developments at midcentury, including plate glass and cast iron, contributed to further divergence between commercial forms and residential types. Even through the Civil War era, however, commercial enterprises in smaller towns sometimes continued to locate in buildings which were outwardly similar to residential structures. The Newport National Bank is an example of this increasingly rare building type.

In 1927, the building was altered in response to expanding business. ground-floor facade was refaced with pressed brick, and large tripartite sash windows were installed, resulting in the present fenestration. The entire ground floor was taken over for banking purposes; a new vault and safe deposit boxes were installed, and meeting and business rooms constructed. took place at this time. The bank occupied the former Women's Christian Temperance Union reading room and community center building across the street (no longer extant) while the alterations were in progress, and reopened on March 12, 1927.

The Newport National Bank was a casualty of the Great Depression: it was ordered closed on November 18, 1929, and the building stood vacant for several years until it was acquired in 1936 by George F. Jones and reopened as the Kenlyn Apartments. It currently contains apartments and office space. Some of the interior features of the bank, including a teller's counter and cage, have been incorporated into the interior of the Newport Town Hall.

Resources reflecting Newport's 19th- and early 20th-century commercial development are rare. The construction of a major limited-access elevated highway through the town in the 1970s destroyed most of Newport's historic commercial district.
