#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Old Stone Inn is located on the north side of U.S. 60 (which follows what used to be the old Lexington-Louisville Turnpike), in Simpsonville. The structure faces south and is situated very close to the road. Five acres of surrounding land and large trees and plantings around the house isolate it from the traffic and nearby houses.

The original inn, constructed of rough rectangular stone laid in regular courses, consisted of twelve rooms, with a full basement. Every room including the front entrance hall had a fireplace. The floors were hardwood put together with pegs. The walls throughout the house are two-feet thick. The inn had two front entrances, one in the center (with a wide double door with a five-light transom) and one to the right of the center door. The second door led directly to the men's bar (closed to women) which was separated from the rest of the inn. (See photo 1.)

An old photograph circa 1870 shows the inn as having three dormers and a cupola. Double chimneys on each side of the structure protrude slightly. A low tetrastyle Grecian porch spands two bays. A wooden stile is pictured in front of the house. (See photo 2.)

Over the years the cupola was removed and the door leading into the men's bar was changed to a window. The front porch was also removed and replaced with a smaller front stoop. Although some alterations have been made, much of the original woodwork remains. The exterior windows and door moldings are reeded with rosettes at the top corners. The front door and interior door jambs have three columns of reeding on both sides and across the top. The original reeded chair-railing remains in three of the four original first-floor rooms. The door facings in all the rooms are of a simple Federal style. The mantels are very plain with rounded shelves. (See photos 3 and 4.)

In the northeast corner of the west rear room is an enclosed staircase leading upstairs. It is enclosed with vertical boards and a beaded diagonal strip.

All the fireplaces in the four upstairs bedrooms have been removed, along with the one in the front entrance hall.

In 1950 a one-room frame addition was made on the northeast side of the house. In 1969 another frame room was added on the west side. Over the years the frame kitchen wing off the back of the house has been enlarged. (See photos 5 and 6.)

Despite the alterations the structure retains many of the original features.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Old Stone Inn was erected as a tavern circa 1817 by Fleming P. Rogers. Because of its conspicious location on a once major road, the inn has always been a landmark. Situated twenty miles east of Louisville on the Louisville-Frankfort-Lexington turnpike, a traveler coming from the east would presumably have hailed it just before he entered the small community of Simpsonville, described "a tavern and a stagecoach town" (Willis (1929), p. 54). The main stone block, one of the few surviving stone structures in the area, remains essentially intact with fine reeded woodwork and other original features.

Fleming P. Rogers

The inn is an unusual survivor of the low Federal type, in stone (not unusual in brick), with paired end-chimneys, and dormers. The broad expanse of the roof and the low first-story give the structure a compact and substantial look.

Fleming P. Rogers began construction on the stone inn in 1817, a year after the small town of Simpsonville was laid out. Fleming P. Rogers, a native of Virginia, bought three hundred acres of land on the Little Bullskin Creek in Shelby County, Kentucky, from Samuel Mitchell on July 1817. The stone for the building was taken from a quarry on the back of the farm (shown on the 1882 Atlas) and the work was done by slave labor. According to tradition Rogers went bankrupt building the stone structure.

In 1833, Rogers sold the nearly completed house to Isaac Greathouse who later sold it to Philip Johnson. In 1835 Johnson sold the house along with two hundred and eighty-one acres of land to Lindsey W. George. The stone house had been completed by the time George moved in in 1835. His son Richard George lived there for forty years and sold it in 1875 to W.L. Hammond. The structure is listed in 1882 as the residence of W.L. Hammond on the Atlas of Henry and Shelby Counties, Kentucky. The house changed hands several times until 1934 when James Tinsley bought it and reopened it as The Old Stone Inn. It has continued to be operated as a restaurant from 1934 until the present time.


