STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Maish House is a now-rare example of a once-typical dwelling -- that of the "prosperous businessman" who made a comfortable life for himself in the commercial opportunities of the mid- and late 19th century. The house exhibits many aspects of high-quality Victorian craftsmanship in decorative features (including a beautiful little burglar alarm/servants' call box which is still operative). It is also an interesting combination of a basic Italianate style with which a variety of Eastlake details, particularly on the interior, has been blended.

The house was built in 1882 by George H. Maish (1835-88), perhaps as a material expression of the successful life which was his in Des Moines. Maish, a native of Pennsylvania, exemplified the Gilded Age ideal of the self-made man. His adaptable nature and business acumen led him from a coal company and bank in Pennsylvania to a fresh start in Des Moines in 1869. His Des Moines career commenced with a partnership with his brother-in-law, Charles A. Weaver, in a drug firm. In 1875 he was a co-founder of the Iowa National Bank, beginning a career in finance which would last until his death. Among his activities were the presidency (1887) of the State Insurance Company and vice-president (1888) of the Iowa National Bank. Beyond the world of finance, Maish in has last years was the treasurer of the Iowa State Agricultural Society and a member of its executive committee.

Maish married Charlotte Weaver, also of Pennsylvania, in 1857 and together they reared seven children. Maish's life reads like the typical American success story, and the beauty of his last home is testimony to his business abilities as well as his aesthetic sensibilities.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Maish House is a two-story frame structure in Italianate style. Its basic shaps is rectangular ($50' \times 75'$), though obscured by various irregularities due to a free-style interior floor plan. The complex hip roof, with recently replaced metal cresting on the ridge, features a number of gables which are completely filled in with glass. Wide eaves are supported with brackets, and there are three corbelled chimneys, which have been rebuilt to their original design.

Due to the plan of the house, window locations are somewhat irregular. All windows are plate glass in double hung sashes. The double-door front entrance features etched glass and gold leaf trim.

A flat-roofed porch extends around three sides of the house. It is supported by slender, square wood columns which are capped with elaborate brackets. Metal balustrading on the roof, the porch steps and balustrading have long been removed.

The interior displays a remarkable collection of decorative features, chosen by George Maish, "with serious consideration to detail" from pattern books so popular during the Victorian era. Flooring is oak or maple, woodwork mostly yellow pine. Main halls on both floors feature bracketted, plaster arches. All the original hardware, including Eastlake brass work, and lighting fixtures remain, the latter still piped for gas as well as wired for electricity. Millwork throughout the house is of very high quality and strongly Eastlake in style, exhibited particularly in the oak staircase, doors and door frames, and a number of built-in cabinets with leaded glass wondows. There are five slate fireplaces, four marbellized and one grained. Victorian-era stenciling has been recently added in some areas.

Lack of maintenance over the years has caused much deterioration to the house, but all problems seem remediable. The house was converted to apartments in 1939, but with little permanent damage to the interior woodwork. The present owners are working actively to restore much of its 19th-century splendor, and hope to set an example for other house owners in this area, which is one of the city's oldest and retains much of its late-Victorian character.
