19. History tenent--"Daniel Boone slept here" deed recorded 1795; log portion of house said to be built soon after his arrival in 1788. Haggard came from Albemarle Co. Va.; Nathaniel and wife Elizabeth members of Old Providence Church and 2 sons were Baptist ministers. Nathaniel died 1806 and Eliz. 1820 and are buried here. 20. Significance An emigrant from Albemarle County, Virginia, Nathaniel Haggard arrived here in 1788. He and his wife were both members of Providence Church, and built this single pen log house soon after they settled this land, which makes the house one of the earliest documented log buildings in the county.
