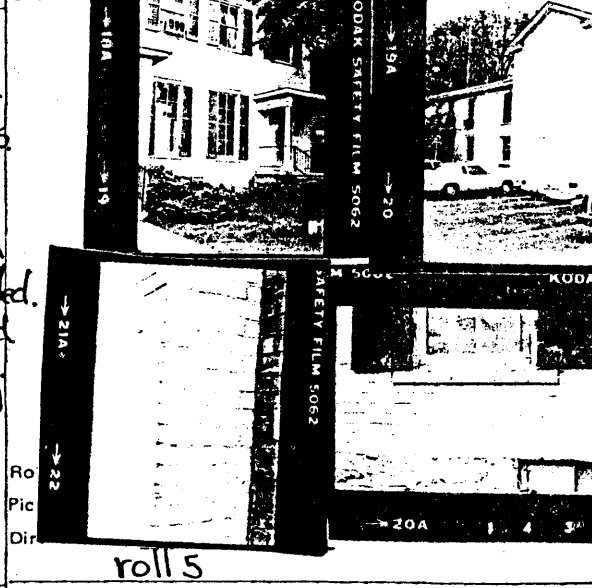

Description Original block - two story - 3 bay brick - side passage plan - jack arches - Flemish bond - Two story two bay brick addition on North - Flemish bond - (bay portion possibly earlier) three interior end chimneys Brick kitchen behind two-bay contemporary with three-bay portion; two bay section & three bay on first floor side passage plan; early Greek moldings; in three bay section Federal moldings. 2 unconnected houses originally; now connected.

Architecture:

Wa-B-21. This pair of row houses is the only surviving instance in Bowling Green's historic core of this once common type. The houses illustrate the conjunction of two of the most popular styles in the first half of the nineteenth century: Federal in the right hand block and Greek in the left. The buildings are also among the few reminders of the nineteenth century importance of North Chestnut Street as a residential avenue.
