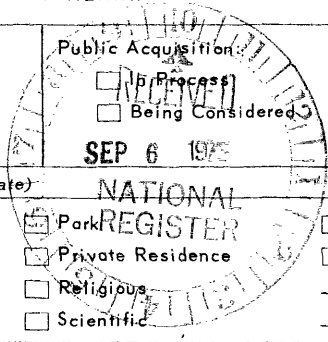

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Pierce-Klingling Mansion was built in 1823 by Joshua Pierce, with the west side addition constructed in 1843. The three story, ten-room Pennsylvania Dutch farmhouse style structure was built of blue and grey granite. The stonework is in good condition and, except for superficial touches, it remains as built. The stone walls are 24" thick and the stone arch and tower in front of the entrance show no signs of deterioration. A two story veranda on the south side has an iron railing of scrollwork in a grape design.

The interior of the building has been somewhat modified with plaster, paint and a heating system. Poplar panelling on the stairwell and most of the mantelpiece remain. An enormous fireplace, 6' long and 4' high with a beehive oven built into the wall beside it, was uncovered by PWA workers in 1937.

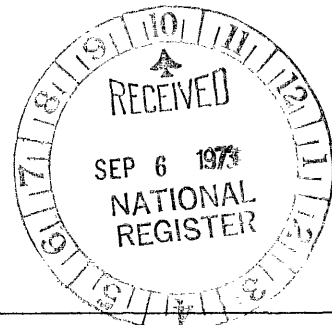
The grounds immediately surrounding the house still bear some of the original plantings by Mr. Pierce, a horticulturist. The estate was once noted for camellias and white pine, but these are mostly gone now. The large hollies, magnolias, and drooping yew found on the terrace are notable.

To the east of the main house is a two-story stone and wood frame barn and carriage house. It is built into the hillside so that each floor has its own entrance corresponding to its ground level. The lower stone story has been authentically restored but the wooden upper level is a reconstruction of an old carriage house modernized for the automobile.

The Utility House is located to the rear and east of the main house, built of granite similar to that of the main house and incorporated into the design of the terrace wall. It is a two story building with 1-1/2' thick walls, 19' in length and 17-1/2' wide. In this structure, each floor has its own entrance which corresponds to its own ground level. The lower floor is not accessible from the top floor because no stairway exists. The building has undergone a change from its original construction in the addition of a brick chimney which was made necessary by the installation of a modern furnace and water heater in the bottom floor. Otherwise the Utility House remains true to its original construction.

The Utility House is mirrored on the west end of the terrace by the Potting Shed which is very similar in design to the Utility House. The Potting Shed is very well preserved and remains a solid stone structure.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Linnaean Hill, built in 1823, by Joshua Pierce was named in honor of the Swedish botanist Karl Van Linnaeus, because the area was so conducive to the raising and growing of shrubs and flowers. The Pierces were extremely interested in horticulture and, shortly after establishing their home at Linnaean Hill, developed it into one of the most beautiful garden spots in the city.

Joshua Pierce also introduced box gardens to Washington. He supplied the first ornamental plantings for the White House, the Capitol and other government buildings and parks. Pierce also maintained the first general nursery in Washington.

Linnaean Hill also became a gathering place for some of Washington's society, notably Daniel Webster, John C. Calhoun, and Henry Clay.

Joshua Pierce died childless and left his estate to a nephew, Joshua Pierce Klinge, who occupied the house with his wife until 1890 when the mansion and grounds were purchased by the U.S. government as a part of Rock Creek Park. In 1937, through PWA funds the house and grounds were restored and leased as a private residence until 1952. From 1956 to 1959, the Junior Nature Center leased Klinge Mansion and, in 1959, it was leased to the Junior League of Washington for its administrative offices. In 1972, the Pierce-Klinge Mansion was again taken over by the National Park Service for use in the green scene programs.

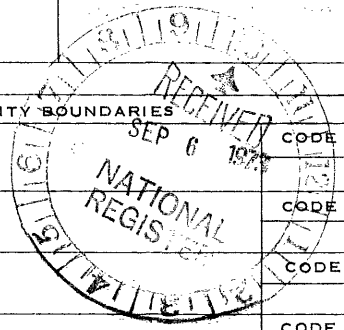
