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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Smith/Joseph/Stratton House is a one-story, wood frame Italianate cottage on the south side of Alabama Street in Montgomery. The five-bay house rests on brick piers approximately 3' high. All exposures of the foundation except the eastern have been bricked. The eastern foundation is obscured by grading.

The low hipped roof is covered by asbestos tiles and is finished by crown molding at the bracketed eaves. The house is further embellished at the cornice by decorative scrollwork applied to the fascia and dentil molding below the soffit. Otherwise, 302 Alabama Street is a simple cottage with 6 over 6 double hung sashes and two brick chimneys. The front entrance has been altered to accommodate double, single light doors and the back porch has been enclosed. (c. 1910)

A special feature of the house is the one-story, two-room servant's quarter, whose porch has also been enclosed. Behind the house and originally oriented toward the back yard, the servant's house was given a McDonough Street entrance c. 1940.

The interior of the Smith house features plaster over lathe walls, four panel pine doors, 5"-6" pine flooring and one iron mantel. Two of the fireplaces have been closed and a third is missing its mantel.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

#### Criterion B - Transportation and Politics

This property is significant for its associations with E. B. Joseph, a developer of and for several years president of Montgomery's electrified street railway system. Joseph was also a noted local politician who served as mayor from 1899 to 1903 and served on the city council for six years, starting in the mid 1880s. Although Joseph occupied this house (which belonged to his father-in-law) only from 1880-1885, it is the only residence surviving from the productive period of his life.

#### Criterion D - Architecture

This is one of the city's few remaining small Italianate cottages dating from the 1850s and is the only one to survive intact with its servant's quarters.


