Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Description

The D.C. McDonald Building is located only two blocks from Humboldt Bay in Eureka's Old Town, surrounded by the historic atmosphere of the city's commercial district of an earlier era. It is a two-story masonry structure with Classical detailing, and is rectangular in plan, 60 feet long and thirty feet wide. The setting is characterized by late 19th century commercial buildings; the Old Town gazebo and fountain occupy the open space across the alley to the south of the building.

Built of cement blocks and bricks, this turn-of-the-century commercial building has its facade on F Street. Six plate glass windows occupy the ground floor and are topped by frosted transom windows. A handsome central arched entry is flanked by fluted pilasters and decorated with a scroll keystone. A wide brick band separates the first and second stories and contains the words which identify the building and its long-time use: GLASS -- D.C. McDonald -- PAINTS. There are four pairs of arched windows, each with a keystone, on the second story with a larger central arched window over the entry. The entablature begins above the arched windows with a brick frieze and a row of dentils inset below the bracketed cornice. A low parapet rises above the cornice.

The south side of the building has a ground floor service door and two second story windows. The rear and north sides adjoin other buildings. Unaltered and in excellent condition, the building is attractively painted; cement blocks and bricks are buff-colored, decorative elements are off-white, and door and window mouldings are green.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The D.C. McDonald Building is an excellent local example of Classical Revival design. It has survived without alteration and is important to Eureka as a good representative of turn-of-the-century commercial architecture, as well as a strong contributor to the architecture and character of Old Town, the old commercial center of the city. It is one of the few and best remaining examples of its styling in the city of Eureka. From the time of its construction in 1904, until the 1960's the building was occupied by the D.C. McDonald Company, an important local building supply firm.

The building was constructed during the summer of 1904 as noted in the April 25, 1904 Humboldt Daily Standard:

F Street is to be adorned in the very near future with another business structure that will be a beauty and will be considerably different from any building now in the city. The building in question will be erected by Mrs. Wallace on her lot between First and Second Streets on the west side of F.

The building is locally significant for its more thanb 55-year association with the D.C. McDonald Company, a building supply business that provided the community with a continually expanding and changing array of materials. Beginning with Daniel C. McDonald about the turn-of-the-century when the business provided residents with "glass, mantels, and builders materials" and continuing under the ownership of the Woodcock family for thirty years and the Lombardi family in the early 1960's, the D.C. McDonald Company played an important role in Eureka's commercial life and physical development. During the 1960's a motorcycle business operated in the building. During the 1970's and to the present, the D.C. McDonald Building has been used for the display and sale of antiques and collectibles.




