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## 7 DESCRIPTION

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Situated on a dirt road in rural East Barre, the Nichols House is a 1-1/2 story, clapboarded rectangular plan structure of post and beam construction. The gable roof is covered with wooden shingles. The central brick chimney has been rebuilt.

On the main (south) elevation, a simple granite block step leads to a central doorway with a multi-paned rectangular transom. Elevations are three bays across, the front door and windows framed by simple wooden surrounds. On the west elevation is a large projecting bay, circa 1879.

The 1/1 windows are painted to imitate 12/12 windows. From the east elevation, there projects a one-story frame ell, added circa 1880. Its gable roof, sheathed with asphalt shingles, projects to form a shallow porch across the front. A small brick chimney breaks the ridge line.

The Nichols House interior floor plan consists of two front rooms, flanking a small frontcentral hall (the staircase removed) with a large room and a small room at the rear. The second floor plan consists of two large rooms connected by a rear hall, entry to the second floor provided by a back staircase, starting from the east ell.

The fireplace wood trim on the second floor is original, while the first floor trim has been extensively altered. There is a large beehive oven in the southeast first floor room.

Typical of the Vermont pre-Greek Revival cape, the interior door and window frames are stylistically undistinguishable, although original throughout most of the house. Evidence exists of a cellar fireplace or cooking area.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Nichols House is an excellent example of the classic "cape-cod" house, as the form was disseminated into Vermont at the time of its early settlement. It represents a house type that was to become extremely popular by the time of the Greek Revival, when vernacular examples began to dominate the Vermont landscape.

Among the first settlers of Barre, Vermont, the Thomas Nichols family migrated from Worchester, Massachusetts in 1799, the date of the birth of their second son and erection of their house in East Barre. Thomas died in 1800, leaving a 17-year-old son, John, to head the Nichols family.

The house remained in the Nichols family until about 1900, the County Gazetteer reporting that the grandson, Thomas B. Nichols, maintained a farm in the 1880's, consisting of 130 acres, 18 head of cattle and 1000 sugar trees. The house is one of the few remaining dwellings built by a first settler family in the Barre-Montpelier area.
