DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Otoe County courthouse, designed by architect A. G. Bassett, is a two-story brick structure built in 1864-1865. The structure has a rubble stone foundation finished with a rough ashlar face. W. R. Craig and F. W. Wood were the builders, with County Commissioner Oliver Sherman supervising the work.

The original 1865 structure makes up the center section of the present building. This structure is a simple two-story rectangle with slight projection at the corners. Entry to the building was originally gained through a central three-story tower on the east which was topped with a cupola of Moorish design. The main body of the building featured round arched windows at the corners and ends of the building on the first floor with segmentally arched windows along the sides (north and south facades). The second floor design, above a stone string course displays tall, round arched windows. These windows feature a stone string course which forms the arch and connects the springing lines of all the window arches around the perimeter of the building. A paneled frieze of brick occupies the space between this string course and the wood cornice which exhibits brackets combined with dentils.

When originally constructed, the building housed the jail in the basement, county offices on the first floor and the District Courtroom on the entire second floor. Two wings were added to the courthouse, one ca. 1882, and the other in 1936. These additions are on the east and west ends of the 1865 structure, resulting in an H-shaped plan for the building.

The first addition was made at the west end, with minor alterations being made in the original structure to accommodate the change. Construction details were continued identical to the original. The main entrance at this time remained on the east.

Later, as the need for more space became apparent, an identical two-story addition was made to the east end of the building resulting in the present form. This addition was made in 1936 at a cost of \$60,000, and resulted in major changes to the original building. The courtroom was moved to the second floor of the new addition, while the remainder of the original building was converted into office space. The original entrance tower was removed and considerable alteration was made to the center of the north side of the original building to accommodate the new main entrance. A secondary entrance on the south and a new stairwell were added through the center of the original building. A new cupola, remotely resembling the original, was built on the axes of the altered building.

The resultant form of the building, as altered, has a classical, rather Beaux-Arts character in the symmetry and disposition of the design elements. The original modified Italianate character of the building is still revealed in the 1865 details which continued to be used through all of the alterations. The only variance from this is seen in the stone "frontspiece" entrance on the north.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

8 SIGNIFICANCE

Otoe County was formed by an act of the Nebraska Territorial Legislature in 1855 and Nebraska City was named the county seat. For several years the county offices had no permanent location with the first few terms of the District Court being held in a log cabin while other offices conducted their business in rented rooms above the downtown stores.

A contract for a substantial county building was made August 13, 1864. A. G. Bassett, the architect, was paid \$150 for his plans and specifications, and builders W. R. Craig and F. W. Wood were hired to start construction immediately. Total cost of erection of the original portion was \$22,500. The Otoe County courthouse is the oldest public building in Nebraska which has been in continuous use since its completion.

The original structure of the courthouse exhibited typical features of early public architecture in Nebraska. The basic form, a two or threestory block with an entrance tower, was used in many communities in Nebraska. for public buildings. Among the most notable examples are the old Furnas, Harlan and Greeley county courthouses, and McCormick and Ringland Halls on the Hastings College Campus in Hastings, Nebraska (See National Register nominations, Adams County, Nebraska).

The significance of the building in its present form lies chiefly in the use of the early details on the entire structure. A sense of the character of the original building is readily at hand through inspection of these details. In addition, the conservatism apparent in the duplication of architect Bassett's details in the enlarging of the building is noteworthy. Many old Nebraska courthouses were either demolished when more space was needed or their integrity was seriously impaired by the indiscriminate addition of a modern building to the original structure.
