#### Narrative Description

Casa Dra. Concha Meléndez Ramírez

#### Summary Paragraph

Casa Dra. Concha Meléndez Ramírez, located in a four hundred and thirty seven (437.50) square meter lot, at 1400 Vilá Mayo Street, in a urban setting at El Condado, a San Juan ward, is a 1940, Spanish Revival, two-story, reinforce concrete building. The property was the residence and workplace of Concha Meléndez Ramírez, a renowned Puerto Rican educator, poet, essayist, literature critic and intellectual.

#### Narrative Description

The building, located in el Condado, one the oldest and most prestigious suburbs in Puerto Rico, consists a of two-story square plan layout. Designed in a sober Spanish Revival style, the most significant architectural elements in the building's exterior façade is the repetition of arcs in the residence first level northwestern corner, emphasizing the balcony, and the second story balcony in the northern main façade. Every double-sided wooden window is crowned with a concrete canopy roofed with clay tiles (Fig. 1).

The building is surrounded by a garden-like rustic trail made out of stone chips, decorated with native plants and geometric planters. There is a covered terrace annexed to the southeastern corner of the house, accessible from the yard and from the house interior. The terrace is twelve-foot by twelve-foot with a flat concrete roof supported by five Corinthian style columns, with clay tiles at the roof edges (Fig. 2). Directly south from the terrace, a Quarter-turn with landing concrete stair provide access to the house's flat concrete roof.

In 1940, a separate one story, two sectional, forty three feet long and ten feet wide, rectangular shaped, concrete building, was erected south of the main house, within the property's lot, to be used as a garage and a small living space with bathroom, for the house service (Fig. 3). The house service quarters have two wooden doors that lead into the garden and to the kitchen entrance of the main house.

In later years, this apartment was used by Dra. Concha Meléndez's sister, Rafaela Meléndez Ramírez, as her private residence. Rafaela Melendez shared ownership of the main residence, but preferred to move into the service room, as the house became not only Dra. Melendez working place, but her social gathering place also. As a resource, the building is not contributing under Criterion B.

The house interior layout responds to the living space distribution of a single dwelling building. A wooden door at the northern façade, the main entrance from the Vilá Mayo Street, guides into a hall. On the east side of the hall, two arched entrances lead into a long open room that comprises the living room and dining room (Fig. 4). The kitchen is access through a wooden door at the southern end of the former dining room.<sup>2</sup> At the western side of the entrance hall the space is divided among the balcony, a studio and a half bathroom.

Past the main entrance, directly south, a Quarter-turn with winders stair guides into the upper floor. The stair lands into a foyer in front of double-sided wooden and glass door that open into Dr. Concha Melendez's office and working area, which have been kept as such, with her library, desks, typing machine, diplomas, medals, personal photos, official photos depicting moments of public recognitions and other memorabilia (Fig. 5). There are two other rooms (bedrooms) and a full, fully functional bathroom in the upper level.

Concha Melendez Ramirez died in 1983, leaving the house by testament to the *Instituto de Cultura Puertorriqueña* (ICP). Although the building it's been used as a library since the 1990s, the interventions conducted by the ICP have not make any alterations to compromise the buildings integrity. The house has kept its historic fabric, the spaces related to the use of the property as a single dwelling unit (exterior and interior) are easily identifiable and those rooms highly associated to Dr. Concha Melendez Ramirez's intellectual production has been properly kept.

#### Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph

Casa Dra. Concha Meléndez Ramirez is of statewide significance under Criterion B as the property was the residence and workplace of Dr. Concha Meléndez Ramírez, a renowned Puerto Rican educator, poet, essayist, literature critic and academic. Dr. Meléndez is one of the most significant intellectuals in Puerto Rico's cultural history. She was a co-founder of the Hispanic Studies Department at the University of Puerto Rico and founder of the Chair of the Hispanic American literature. Known as a great and passionate educator, Melendez played an important role in the formation of many generations of new writers. Dr. Meléndez was internationally known for her profound essays on literary critic. Her acute and deep study and analysis of the Latin American literature, while doing the same with the local production, helped to project and understand the Puerto Rican literature within a wider scope. Meléndez was also a strong supporter for the defense and proper use of the Spanish language in an island politically and culturally intervened by an Anglo-Saxon power, the United States.

#### Narrative Statement of Significance

Concha Meléndez Ramírez was born in the city of Caguas, Puerto Rico, on January 21, 1895 (Fig. 6). At the age of seven, her family moved to San Juan. After graduating from the Normal School at the University of Puerto Rico (UPR), Miss Melendez became a teacher at the UPR High School. In 1926, Concha Meléndez obtained a Masters in Arts from Columbia University in New York and by 1932 completed her doctoral degree in Philosophy and Letters at the *Universidad Autonóma de Méjico*. Dra. Mélendez became the first woman to earn a Ph.D. from the prestigious Mexican school.

A lifetime bachelorette, Miss Meléndez dedicated her entire life to the cultural and academic world. She became an essential member of what was later known as the Generación de los Treinta (the Thirties' Generation), a group of academics that molded and guided the cultural development of Puerto Rico for generations to come. In the 1930s, the economic crisis created by the Great Depression caused also a crisis in the Puerto Rican culture that, among many other things, questioned the political relationship with the United States and the lack of a position to define the national identity of Puerto Rico. Many intellectuals of the Generación de los Treinta searched for that definition in the Hispanic ascendancy, the African traditions and the local Native American legacy rooted within the Puerto Rican cultural network. Concha Meléndez represents that part of the Generación that believed that the Puerto Rican culture could only be capture and defined as an integral part of the Latin American culture as a whole. Departing from that perspective, the intellectual work done by Miss Meléndez had a wide scope, oriented towards the study of Latin American and Puerto Rican literature. As she understood it, at the center of the cultural crisis was the lack of professional studies of Latin American literature and how the Puerto Rican literature was part of that cultural universe. According to Dr. Meléndez, the insertion of Puerto Rico within the Latin American cultural network, along with the strong defense of the Spanish language, was the best offense against what many of the Generación de los Treinta saw as the ideological attack coming from United States' policies. An example of these policies was the imposition of the English language as a primary educational tool in the local schools. Dr. Meléndez, together with Nilita Vientós Gastón and Margot Arce de Vazquez, became the female trilogy with strong and determining presence within la Generación de los Treinta, a male dominated cultural period.

After completing her Ph.D. in Mexico and coming back to Puerto Rico, Melendez's intellectual life transited over two principal lanes: her work as an educator at the University of Puerto Rico and her literary production, mostly as an essayist. Starting in 1922, Concha Meléndez taught at the UPR for thirty-four years. Still remembered as a Teacher of teachers, the UPR became her pulpit from where she influenced many generations of new students, even after her official retirement in 1956, as she was continuously invited to the UPR for lectures and conferences. Throughout those years at the UPR, she emphasized the study of the Latin American Literature, being a co-founder of the all-important Hispanic Studies Department. Meléndez established the Chair of Hispanic American Literature and was the Dean of the Hispanic Studies Department from 1940 until 1943.

Along with her career as an educator, and not separated from it, Meléndez had a fruitful production as a writer, especially with literature critic essays like Amado Nervo (1926), La novela indianista de Hispanoamérica (1934), Signos de Iberoamérica (1936), Pablo Neruda; Vida y obra (1936), Entrada en el Perú (1941), Asomante, Estudios Hispanoamericanos (1943), La Inquietud Sosegada: Poética de Evaristo Rivera Chevremont (1946), Cuentos Hispanoamericanos (1953), El arte del cuento en Puerto Rico (1961), Moradas de poesía en Alfonso Reyes (1971), among many others. She also conducted profound studies and wrote analitical essays in Puerto Rican writers like novelists Enrique Laguerre and René Marquez; her

dearests poet José de Diego and the great thinker Eugenio Maria de Hostos. Meléndez contributed with many articles for local and international newspapers and literary specialized magazines. Her prodigious collective work was later compiled in fifteen volumes, published by the ICP in the 1980s.

Meléndez's work took her into direct contact with some of the most renowned literature figures of her time, producing a personal epistolary of great relevance. These personal letters have become a valuable piece of literature by themselves. Among her literary correspondents were writers like the Nobel Prize winners Pablo Neruda and Gabriela Mistral; also Alfonso Reyes, Jorge Carrera Andrade and Raimundo Lida, Enrique José Varona, Jorge Manach, Ciro Alegría, and many others. They all considered the work done by Meléndez to be an extremely significant contribution to the understanding and analysis of the American literature. As early as 1931, Gabriela Mistral commented about "the talent, the culture and the profound and mature critic of the Puerto Rican essayist".

Throughout her life, Dr. Meléndez received numerous local and international recognitions for her great intellectual contributions. Her publications received medals and awards from the *Ateneo Puertorriqueño* and *Instituto de Cultura Puertorriqueña*. In 1970, she became the first woman ever to be invited to formally lecture at the *Real Academia de la Lengua Española* in Mexico. Meléndez was also the first woman member of the Puerto Rican Academy of the Spanish Language. In 1971, Dr. Meléndez received from the government of Venezuela the prestigious award *Andrés Bello*, the first time that the recognition was bestowed upon a non-Venezuelan woman (Fig. 7). That very same year, she was designated *Woman of the Year* by the Union of American Women (Fig. 8). In 1979, Concha Meléndez was declared *Humanist of the Year* by the Puerto Rican Foundation for the Humanities. Also in 1979, the Puerto Rican writer was selected to be recorded as part of the Library of Congress' program *Archives of Latin American Literature*. Initiated in 1942, by 1979 the archives consisted of the voice recording of 265 carefully selected Hispanic writers, among who were great masters like Miguel Angel Asturias, Juan Ramón Jiménez, Pablo Neruda, Gabriela Mistral, Nicolás Guillén and Jorge Guillén. Concha Meléndez earned her place among the greatests.

Concha Meléndez Ramírez died on June 26, 1983, at the age of 88. The property known today as Casa Biblioteca Dra. Concha Meléndez Ramírez was her residence and place of work for forty-three years. Concha and her older sister, Rafaela Meléndez, acquired the lot in el Condado in August 1939. The two-story house was recorded as built in January 1940. The ownership of the lot and building was equally shared by both sisters. Rafaela, like Concha, never married. She died in May 31,1969, leaving her share of the property entirely to her younger sibling.<sup>3</sup> Concha Meléndez transformed the house into her personal library, collecting over four thousand books; books that she used to call "my children". The residence became her place for social gatherings. Almost every interview done for magazines and newspapers, incluiding the recording for the Library of Congress, were either conducted at the gardens, surrounded by the plants and her two dogs that she loved so much, or at her sanctuary, the studio where she worked (Fig. 9). In every way, the property is associated with the productive life of Dr. Meléndez, one of the most significant and influential academics in Puerto Rico's cultural history.


