Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Interior Telephone Company Building is located on 5th Avenue mid-block between Main and Broad Streets and adjacent on the east to a north-south alley. The building faces south. It is situated one-half block west of the United States Post Office. The building is surrounded by other commercial buildings ranging in height from one to four stories.

This building was constructed as a 1-story, stand-alone structure with a raised basement. There is a walkway between the building and its neighbor on the east--an unusual feature in a commercial area and perhaps related to fire safety.

The building is 1-story above a raised basement. The basement is emphasized on the exterior facades with a deep, mauve-brown brick laid in raised and recessed horizontal courses. The foundation of the building is exceptionally high, emphasized with horizontal brickwork. The west side of the building duplicates the material and decoration appearing on the east facade including decorative brickwork and fenestration.

The street facade's first story has the main entrance located on the right side, and the remaining facade space is occupied by a grouping of three windows. Entrance to the building is gained by a series of concrete steps from grade to the front door. Because it was built for a service business rather than a retail one, the windows are not large expansions of plate glass, but double-hung sashes in the front and steel commercial style along the sides. Two rectangular windows on the street facade have been boarded in, as has a transom light over the entrance. These panels have raised molding recalling fretwork patterns. The basement windows along the side facades are irregularly spaced but align with ones on the first story whenever they do appear. Although the brick on the main level is a tannish color, bands of darker brick at the basement level separate the windows and the door. All the brick has random speckles of black oxidized iron. Mortar joints are exceptionally narrow. The entrance is recessed deeply into the plane of the facade with exterior stairs ascending to it. Above the fenestration, a more variegated, tannish brick delineates rectangular panels in the cornice beneath corbeling. The corbeling continues along the side facades about one-third of the distance. In the cornice along the side facades, raised brick panels spell out "I.T.C.," the initials of the firm. The building is narrow and deep; the shed roof slopes to the rear.

The interior of the building has retained little visible integrity of original material and the architectural significance of this space has been impaired.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Interior Telephone Company Building, located in the northern part of Grinnell's central business district and constructed in 1912, is significant under Criterion C in illustrating an architectural design which embodies a period of style. Influenced by the commercial style of architecture, the building is distinguished by a rich pallette of brick coloration and texture, and also by brick patterns. The quality materials and architectural detailing on the building convey a feeling of integrity to the viewer, an important asset for a service related business to project. The building also calls attention to the expansion of Grinnell's historic business district to the north.

The building's first floor rests on a high foundation illustrating the nature of its original occupant, a telephone exchange. A high basement was necessary to house telephone equipment. The siting of the building is also significant. Safety precautions appear to have required the building to stand-alone. The building shares no common walls with other buildings. Executed in brick, it is a fine, single-story example of the commercial style as interpreted in Grinnell. Horizontal patterns are achieved in the brickwork through courses laid flush and recessed. Brick color varies with mauve-brown, tan, and dark brown. The sides of the building feature "I. T. C.," the initials of the firm, worked in brick, a charming and naive conceit suggesting a brick-mason's responsibility for design.

The building is in almost unaltered condition. It was not built as a store front but as a telephone exchange and office, so it differs in design from retail buildings of the period. This is most evident in the above grade first floor. No architect has yet been identified for this building.

The Interior Telephone Company appears to have been organized to provide local service to Grinnell and environs. There was also a competing local telephone company in Grinnell. (An intensive survey of the Grinnell business district did not identify a building constructed by this competing company and it is thought that it may have leased offices in Grinnell). Iowa was in the forefront of states in the Upper Midwest to adopt the telephone as a means of communication. By 1920, 86% of Iowa farms were reportedly on telephone exchanges. About half of the telephones at that time were owned by the Northwestern Bell Company. The remainder were owned by more than 500 independent telephone companies providing local service and connecting to the Bell system for long distance. Independent telephone companies remain strong in Iowa. As of 1951, for example, more than 37% of Iowa telephones were still independently operated. The Interior Telephone Company operated in Grinnell into the 1960s.

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

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The Interior Telephone Company building relates in scale, design, building type, and materials to its neighbor on the west, the "Grinnell Herald" Building. Erected in 1916, this building isalso being nominated under "Architectural and Historical Resources of Grinnell, Iowa" multiple property listing.

The Interior Telephone Company Building, taken together with the "Grinnell Herald" Building next door at 813 5th Avenue and the Grinnell Armory at 816 5th Avenue, all illustrate the physical growth of Grinnell's central business district into 5th Avenue.

The Interior Telephone Company is a fine, single story, brick building from the second decade of the . Twentieth Century and remains in almost unaltered condition. It was not built as a storefront, but as a telephone exchange and office, so it differs in design from retail buildings of the period. Executed in brick, it rests on a high foundation with horizontal (stone-like) emphasis. Throughout the building, the decorative elements are created by brick patterning. No architect has yet been identified for this building.
