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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Knight cabin is set in a wooded area on the Washington Parish fairgrounds. It was moved to that location when it was threatened with demolition by a highway project. Originally the cabin was just northwest of Enon on Route 16. Several other moved houses are within sight but they are not close enough to affect the Knight cabin's immediate setting.

The house itself consists of one large room with a sleeping loft in part of the attic. The porches are replaced as is the mud chimney and the roof.

The cabin is constructed of split half-round logs which are square-notched at the corners. The windows have much of the original glass but the mantel is relatively new.

Because the cabin has been moved from its original site, only the building itself is being nominated to the Register.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Knight cabin is significant as a surviving representative example of the smaller German log house, a vernacular house type which is rare in Washington Parish.

Because Washington Parish was settled relatively late, the Knight cabin is one of the oldest structures in the parish. Crudely built from found materials, it symbolizes the agricultural pioneer phase of the parish's development as few extant structures do. It is associated with the Knight family, who seem to have been typical of the farming families who lived in middle and late nineteenth-century Washington Parish.

According to local tradition, the Knight cabin was constructed in 1857 by George and Martha Knight.<sup>1</sup> (Since a courthouse fire in 1897 destroyed the local records of Washington Parish, most important early documents on the Knights and their land no longer exist.<sup>2</sup>)

The 1860 Census listed George Knight, a native of Louisiana, as a 28-year-old farmer with real estate valued at \$800 and personal estate at \$483. Living in the same household were his 19-year-old wife Martha Anne, who had been born in Mississippi, and their one-year-old daughter Margery.<sup>3</sup> In 1870, there were six children-four daughters and two sons. Knight owned about 175 acres of land and the estimated value of all his farm production for the previous year was  $\$760.^4$ 

The Census of 1880 found the parents and seven children living in the household. There were five sons and two daughters; five of the children were ten or under. By this time the four older daughters had apparently moved out.<sup>5</sup> The Agriculture Census for 1880 provides many details concerning George Knight's farm. By this time he owned 250 acres, of which twenty-five were under cultivation. The value of the farm, including land, fences, and buildings, was listed as \$750. Knight owned \$150 worth of implements and machinery and \$300 worth of livestock. The estimated value of all his farm productions for 1879 was \$300. The livestock included two horses, two oxen, sixteen milch cows, twenty other cows, sixteen calves, 75 swine, and thirty poultry. In 1879, the farm produced two hundred pounds of butter and 150 dozen eggs. In addition, ten acres of corn yielded 150 bushels, one-half acre of sugar yielded 120 gallons of molasses, 1% acres of sweet potatoes yielded 125 bushels.<sup>6</sup>
