DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Blue Hill was in the northwest corner of Oklahoma City in 1894 when officials of the growing St. Joseph's parish paid \$750 for three lots at 4th and Harvey on which to build their new church. Excavation for the basement began Oct. 19, 1902. The cornerstone, proclaiming "founded by the '89ers," was laid December 17, 1902. The impressive structure, completed in less than two years, was dedicated December 18, 1904. So impressed was Pope Pius X with the church organization in the young territory that he soon raised the Vicariate of Indian Territory to a diocese. St. Joseph's became Oklahoma City's first cathedral in 1905.

Basement of the church is of stone and concrete. Church itself is of red brick with cut-stone trim. Architecturally (the original architect left town before the basement was completed, taking the plans with him), it is a relatively plain Gothic structure, 64 feet by 138 feet. Basically it is a rectangle with buttresses on either side separating seven tall arched windows featuring imported stained glass.

A soaring tower covers the main entrance at the head of the nave. It is flanked by twin corner towers, also square and supported by buttresses. The central tower is topped by a shingled steeple and the traditional cross. The shorter towers are flat-topped, crenelated, their corners marked with miniature towers. Exterior ornamentation is limited to brick work in the cornices of the towers and the church itself, white cut-stone panels near the top of the two corner towers and similar stone work on the many buttresses.

Interior of St. Joseph's was refurbished throughout in the \$250,000 restoration completed in 1976. Fortunately, most of the original features and furnishings survived the years of neglect that preceded restoration so that the nave today looks much as it did when the church was completed.

The arched windows with their imported stained glass panels have been painstakingly cleaned and protected with a plastic finish to give the interior a soft natural light. Walls, vaulted ceilings, and two stately rows of columns separating the nave from the side aisles have all been smoothed and carefully hand-painted. Cracked pews and scuffed floor have been restored, cushioned and carpeted. Original brass and gold features of both religious and historical value have also been polished and restored.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

St. Joseph's "Old" Cathedral is something more than a handsome monument to Catholicism in Oklahoma's capital city. It stands, in a sense, as a fitting memorial to both religion and education in early-day Oklahoma City ... and to the character of the pioneer citizens who fashioned that city from virgin prairie following the famed "run" of April 22, 1889.

* * *

On the day of the run itself - a Monday - J. K. McGinley erected a tent on Main Street and opened a grocery store. Early the next Sunday morning - April 28 - the Rev. N. F. Scallan stood in the tent before an old table and intoned the Latin words of the mass, "In nomine Patre, et Filio, et Spirito Sancto . . ." Oklahoma City's first Roman Catholic mass and - because several Protestant denominations had not yet gathered - first religious service had begun.

Formal organization of the parish began May 19. Three lots were purchased on Harvey four blocks north of Main. Construction of a frame building was begun August 4 - the first actual church building of any denomination in the new city. Father Scallan stayed on as pastor the first year, organizing Oklahoma City's first school. Classes were held in the church.

Lots on which the present St. Joseph's stands (across the street from the frame church) were purchased in 1894 for \$750. Cornerstone of the impressive red brick Gothic structure (proudly proclaiming "... founded by the '89ers...") was laid Dec. 17, 1902. The church was completed in 1904 and dedicated December 18. The following year it became Oklahoma City's first cathedral. Then in 1925, with the city expanding in all directions, a new seat for the diocese was declared. St. Joseph's became the "old" cathedral. Commercial buildings soon engulfed the church. Parishioners moved to new areas of the city, taking church membership with them to newer congregations. In time neglect, and vandalism, reduced St. Joseph's to a dilapidated shadow of its once-proud elegance.

Finally, in 1975, a \$250,000 restoration of St. Joseph's got under way. It was completed in 1976. Emphasis throughout was on preserving all features and furnishings of both religious and historical value. Hand-painted walls and vaulted ceilings have been carefully preserved, as have the original imported stained-glass windows. Original brass and gold pieces have been restored, pews and floor refinished. Today St. Joseph's stands much as it did when dedicated in 1904 - its slender steeple now dwarfed by the much taller towers of a major city, but its handsome Gothic bulk still an impressive memorial to the spiritual values brought to their new homeland by the capital's first settlers.

Memo to Herbert Brito:

This is a follow-up to our telephone conversation this afternoon concerning the architectural significance of St. Joseph's (Old) Cathedral in Oklahoma City. Thank you for the opportunity to amplify - justify, perhaps? - some of the statements made in our nomination.

what is needed more than anything else, perhaps, is to recall that St. Joseph's was erected just 13 years after Old Oklahoma was thrown open to settlement. This was a flat, virtually treeless plain on the frontier then. Now in just over a dozen years the bustling new city had put up an impressive red brick church with soaring tower that was an immediate landmark.

It is in this contest, of course, that words like "impressive," "handsome," "soaring," and "landmark" must be considered. Had St. Joseph's been erected in Boston or Fhiladelphia in 1902-1903, it might well have been overlooked - then and today. In Oklahoma City with its cluster of two and three-story business buildings and one and two-story frame residences it could not be overlooked conveniently. Indeed, atop a modest hill, it in fact overlooked the sprawling city itself!

As for whether or not it is "handsome," that's a judgment call. We feel strongly that it is. Its lines are strong, clean, unmarred by excessive ornamentation. Considering these features, when the church was built, and where, we feel eminently justified in nominating St. Joseph's for National Register status.
