

	A two-story frame house resting on a concrete block foundation, the Jim Godsey House is covered by weatherboarding and is rectangular in plan. A one-story ell is attached to the house's rear elevation. The house has a metal gable roof, with paired interior brick chimneys on the main part of the house, and with a central brick chimney on the ell. The three bay facade (north elevation) has a central doorway with 2/2 light windows on each side. The second floor repeats this arrangement. The windows and doors have cornice heads and wood surrounds. A two-tiered porch with shed roof extends across most of the facade and four square bracketed posts with sawn balustrades are found on each floor of the porch. The rear ell has a one story porch with shed roof supported by three square bracketed posts. Other decorative elements on the house include cornerboards with molded heads and bargeboards in the gable ends.		
	Built in 1910, the Jim Godsey House typifies to two stories in height with gable roof, interious second most frequent housing type in the count until the early 1900's in the survey area. The of-the-century tastes reflected in the details with bracketed posts and sawn balustrade, bargand cornerboards with molded heads. Verbal Boundary Description and Justification:

32. The boundaries begin at the southeast corner of the intersection of Concord Road and Highway 30, thence south along Concord Road 150 feet, thence west 275 feet, thence north 150 feet to the property line, thence easterly along said property line 300 feet to the beginning. Due to the lack of property lines or visual boundaries on the south and west sides, imaginary boundary lines were established to include the house and approximately .9 acres of land on which it sits.
