Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Lower Avenue A Historic District is located in Rome, Floyd County, Georgia. It is part of a late nineteenth-early twentieth century residential area known as DeSoto, which began as a separate suburban village on the Oostanaula's west bank across from Rome's Between the Rivers commercial and residential area. This area continued to develop as a suburb after its 1885 annexation by the city. Lower Avenue A Historic District has been isolated from the much larger Upper Avenue A Historic District to its north by Turner-McCall Boulevard. The district consists of nine houses along the east side of Avenue A. These structures are nearly all located on 50 foot by 200 foot lots and are set back uniformly from the street with minimal landscaping consisting of well-kept lawns with a few hedges and shrubs. The houses, built from the 1880s to the 1920s, are modest frame structures with little detailing. All but one are one story. All have porches and a number have a front gable that is centered above the porch roof.

#### Boundary

The nominated property consists of one of two areas remaining in Rome's Old Fourth Ward (DeSoto) that contains an intact group of historically significant structures. Vacant land and church parking lots are located on the west side of Avenue A in this block. To the north is Turner-McCall Boulevard, an old street drastically widened in the 1960s which cuts off Lower Avenue A from Upper Avenue A, once part of the same neighborhood. The Oostanaula River and newer development lie to the east. Commercial buildings and modern structures are located along north Fifth Avenue to the south.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

#### Summary Statement of Significance

Lower Avenue A Historic District is historically significant in terms of community planning and development and architecture. In terms of community planning and development, the district is significant for its development as part of DeSoto, an early suburb of Rome. In terms of architecture, the district is significant for its group of intact residences that documents lower-middle class housing types in Rome from the 1880s to the 1920s. These areas of significance support district eligibility under National Register criteria A and C.

#### Community Planning and Development

The Lower Avenue A area developed originally as part of the village of DeSoto, an early suburb of Rome located on the flat land west of the Oostanaula River and Rome's historic commercial and residential center known as Between the Rivers. DeSoto began a slow growth in the 1870s and 1880s as Rome entrepreneurs and land companies laid out streets and sold lots in the area. The development moved northward into the Lower Avenue A residential area from North Fifth Avenue, the village's commercial center located immediately to the south of the Lower Avenue A Historic District. 1885 DeSoto was annexed by the City of Rome, becoming the Fourth Ward. The construction of a bridge in 1886 connecting the DeSoto area with Between the Rivers, the arrival of a street car line, and the location in the immediate area of a number of industries that provided many jobs were three factors that contributed to the rapid growth of the whole neighborhood in the late-nineteenth and early-twentieth centuries. Its development as a suburb, quickly annexed by the city, is typical of the surburbs that began to appear nationwide as new theories about the advantages of suburban living developed and methods of transportation improved.

#### Architecture

The modest one-story frame houses with little detailing that make up the majority of the houses in this district document one type of housing typically found in Rome in the years around the turn-of-the-century. These simple, solid houses, some with a full front porch topped by a small central gable extending from a truncated hipped roof, and others duplexes, each with two small front porches, provide an intact picture of a once common housing stock associated with Rome's lower-middle class. Few intact areas with houses such as these remain in the city, adding to the significance of the Lower Avenue A Historic District.


#### Location
