Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Moir Building is a rectangular, three story structure constructed of brick with sanstone (possibly terr-cotta), cast iron and wood embellishments. The Composition is eclectic, drawn upon Queen Anne and Romanesque Revival styles. Slanted bay windows and a round corner tower dominate the upper stories of this 1893 commerical/ residential structure. The building is oriented with the main facade on the eastern side. Some architectural detailing appears on the northern side, but the western and southern sides are undistingushed. The building measures 107 feet in length by 76 feet wide. The exterior has been painted.

The facade is divided into six bays at the street level. Sandstone piers with acanthus capitals occur at the south end and the center of the building (Orginally a third occured at the northeast corner). Secondary divisions are created by the sandstone arch (the entrance to the upper floors) and the modified piers that remain of an identical standstone arch also leading to the upper floors; this entrance was altered prior to 1938. Between the arches and piers are four store fronts. Cast iron columns define the original window pattern of all the shops, but only the southernmost retains the orginal configuration, design and materials. The remaining three, and the one created within the former entrance arch are of a later (c. 1950) design, set back behind the cast iron columns. The rusticated Romanesque entrance contains three marble steps leading to the double, French style, pane-over-panel doors. The facade of the upper stories is divided into seven bays with a round tower orginally crowned with a victorian cap and weathercock at the corner. Four bays are defined by slanted bay windows. There are three sets of paired windows, round headed at the third floor. Round port hole windows have been added between the slanted bays on the eastern facade, over the orginal upper story entrances. Decorative panels, dentils and archivolt trim with elongated key stones give texture to the facade. Two metal fire escape structures, c. 1938, and a neon sign proclaiming "Hotel St. James" have been added to the facade. The bracketed cornice features a band of dentils above a plain frieze; an ornamental frame containing MOIR BUILDING is centered in the frieze. Abeve the cornice a parapet surrounds the flat roof and is capped with a string moulding. Treatment of the north side is similar to the facade, but limited to two slanted bay windows and four round-headed window units with keystones.

The rear wall fenestration is a repetitive pattern of segmentally-arched windows separated by a similarly styled doors in between. The lower floor has been modified (c. 1930) to include metal casement windows. A porch (in deteriorated condition) serves the second floor and provides a landing for the exit stairs from the third floor.

The southern side of the structure is devoid of ornamentation except for a coursing at the second level which is obscured by an adjacent structure. A recess occurs in the wall at the second and third level which contains rectangular double hung windows.

The interior features include stairways with turned balusters, paneled wainscot, plaster ornamentation including rosettes, mouldings, and cherubs in the tower windows rooms. Light shafts, a large skylight and two-story light well provide the interior with natural light. The building has been occupied, until recent years when the upper floors were closed, and is in good condition.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Moir Building is a locally significant example of late 19th century commercial architecture; played an important role in the development of local commerce through its prime tenant, the San Jose Board of Trade, forerunner of the Chamber of Commerce; and is directly associated with an important local developer-entrepreneur, William Moir.


The architectural style represented in the Moir Building is an eclectic combination of Queen Anne and Romanesque Revival styles. It is an excellent representative of late nineteenth century commercial archfecture and is one of the last remaining examples of its type and period in San Jose.

The prime tenant, occupying the southern divisions of the first floor, was the San Jose Board of Trade. During the time the Board of Trade occupied the building it promoted effectively the attributes of life in the Santa Clara Valley. It aevertised the high potential for growth in agriculture and business in publications, and organized displays in offices and at fairs. Its promotional activities were an important factor in the growth and development of the area.

The developer, William Moir, was a young businessman in his early twenties when he built this structure. This may have been his first major mixed use development; it was located in the expanding commercial area north of downtown. Records indicate that several tenants living in flats had their business on the ground floor.-This included Moir who was a bicycle enthusiast and had a bicycle shop next to the Board of Trade. Moir also served as director of the Board of Trade. After completing several developments in the city, Moir and his family moved to the south county area where he developed and managed a large agricultural interest.
