#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Hillcrest is a two-story, early-twentieth century Neoclassical style house located on a large landscaped lot in Cochran. The rectangular house has a rear kitchen ell with a partly enclosed back porch. It is weatherboarded, with a hipped roof, sits on a brick foundation and has four tall corbeled chimneys. The front facade has a massive two-story entrance portico, with oversized columns with Ionic Capitals and a decorated pediment, and a one-story wrap-around porch with a balcony resting on the porch roof in the portico area. An entablature with a bracketed cornice wraps around the entire house. Windows are one-over-one double hung sash, some with leaded glass in the upper sash; the front entrance has double doors and sidelights with beveled glass and leaded overlights. The interior features a variation of a four-over-four room plan with large central halls on both floors. Downstairs, the front hall is separated from the rear stair hall by an open room divider with arched openings supported by Ionic columns resting on paneled plinths. The main open three-run stairway is finely crafted with turned balusters and square newels topped with urns. Other downstairs features include paneled wainscoting in the hall, drawing room and dining room, three fire-places with oak mantels, pocket doors between rooms and built in china cabinets and a bay window in the dining room. What was probably the original kitchen has been converted into a bedroom, bathroom and closet; the present kitchen is located in an enclosed section of the back porch. On the second floor are three bedrooms, all with fireplaces, and two baths. The central hall is subdivided by French doors; its rear section has tongue-and-groove wainscoting and the front section has a cross plan formed by four corner closets with curved walls. Finishing details include plastered ceilings and walls and pine floors. Some original lighting fixtures are still in place. The house was renovated in the 1970's after years of neglect and subdivision into three apartments. Hillcrest is located on a spacious corner lot atop a hill. The grounds are landscaped with lawn, cedar trees and other hardwoods, flowering trees, shrubs and gardens. A walk paved with hexagonal tiles leads from Beach Street to the main entrance; a low brick retaining wall runs along Beech Street; and a long drive leads up to the house from 7th Street. A 1960's garage/workshop, located along the rear property line, is the only outbuilding. Adjacent to the property is a large house of slightly earlier date originally occupied by the first owner's parents. The house is located only a few blocks from the main streets through Cochran.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Hillcrest is significant in terms of Georgia's architectural and local history. Architecturally, Hillcrest is a fine example of a turn-of-the-century Neoclassical style house in Cochran. This style was particularly popular in Georgia at a time when many communities were experiencing a period of rapid growth and prosperity and it was frequently selected for new homes by prominent families. Hillcrest exhibits many typical features of a high style Neoclassical house: an imposing front facade with a monumental portico, large rooms, and interior detailing such as paneled wainscoting, built-in dining room cabinets and stairs and room dividers with Classical details including Ionic columns and urns. In terms of local history, the house is significant for its association with the John Joseph Taylor and John Augustus Walker families. John Joseph Taylor (1855-1917) was for some years Cochran's leading businessman, originally owner of a general store and later president of the Cochran Banking Company and a local cotton mill, builder of Cochran's opera house and organizer and stockholder in an oil mill and warehouse. Taylor, who lived in the house next door, built "Hillcrest" as a wedding present for his daughter Alice when she married JohnAugustus Walker on January 12, 1910. Walker was connected with the Cochran Banking Company and served as Postmaster from 1933 to 1941. Cochran, county seat of Bleckley County from its creation in 1912, had been incorporated in 1869. Hillcrest is representative of the fine houses that were built there in the early years of the twentieth century at a time when the town was experiencing a period of rapid growth and prosperity that caused the area to push for designation as a separate county. The Walkers raised two daughters in the house and it remained in the family until In 1970 it was purchased by Dr. Virlon Griner, pastor of Cochran's First Baptist 1965. Church, who began the restoration of the house and grounds by converting it from apartments back to a single family dwelling. It was sold to the current owners in 1981.

These areas of significance support property eligibility under National Register Criteria B and C.

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


